

Libbey Bowl Remodel Update

Conceptual Design Due in October

David Bury, of David Bury and Company Architects, was awarded the contract to perform a comprehensive study for rebuilding **Libbey Bowl**, by the **Ojai City Council**, in a unanimous March 12 vote. The **Conceptual Design** is due out in October.

According to Bury, "It's going well, we are in progress on the design side. We are meeting with a lot of interested participants in the process. We

hope to be presenting a conceptual design to the community and the city some time in October. It's purely conceptual at this point, we are going to try to address the concerns and considerations that people have. There are a lot of users with specific needs which need to be addressed.

We're very sensitive to the environment and the history and culture there. It's a very involved process but it seems to be going well so far. Since then (after City Council vote) a survey has been completed of the bowl itself, the topographic survey, a user survey of the primary users of the bowl (Shakespeare Festi-vals, Village Tales, Ojai Music Festival, others, etc.) getting their input on issues and opportunities in the process

We are also working with historians; a professional historical consultant who has been brought in to look at the project who is already under contract to the city. San Buenaventura Research Associates in Santa Paula, Judith Triem, Principal Historian.

We are trying to come up with a community based solution and the ultimate goal is to have the reconstructed bowl open for its first concert in early June of 2010. We are going to reconstruct it but we are not going to rebuild it precisely. We want to optimize it but still retain the character.

Kathy Nolan is a landscape designer in Ojai, very well known in the valley. She is part of my team and has a deep understanding

of the trees and landscaping issues of the valey. She's top notch... we're also working with **Jones and Jones**, a construction management company and they are analyzing construction costs to make sure that we stay on or below

It's a very very challenging project," Bury concluded.

Final Biological Opinon on Freeman Diversion Calls for Improved Steelhead Passage

fter years of delays and stalling tactics on the part of **United Water** Conservation District (United), the water agency that operates the Freeman Diversion on the Santa Clara River near Saticov,

federal scientists are calling for a speedy resolution to the current lack of effective fish passage at the Freeman Diversion, a situation closely linked to the Southern Steelhead's near extinction upstream.

The final Biological Opinion pro-

posed by fisheries scientists with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS), which has jurisdiction over the endangered Southern Steelhead, was released in late July 2008. It concludes that the continued operation of the Freeman Diversion facility by United is likely to jeopardize the continued existence of the Southern Steelhead.

This follows closely on the heels of another final Biological Opinion published by NMFS on the operation of the Santa Felicia Dam on Lake Piru, which is in the Santa Clara River watershed upstream from the **Freeman Diversion**. This decision was also what is known as a jeopardy opinion. It is unprecedented for two jeopardy opinions to be published regarding the operations of the same water agency, within the same watershed.


According to Craig Wingert, NMFS' supervisory fisheries biologist, the Freeman Diversion facility currently "creates a pinch point in the system, and it will prevent Steelhead from getting to where they need to spawn.

The final **Biological Opinion** calls for an expert panel to be set up at once, to recommend specific improvements to the Freeman Diversion's current fishladder, which has been ineffective at passing Steelhead on their annual upstream

migration. Only a handful of migrating Steelhead have been recorded at the fishladder since it was completed in 1993.

The deadline of three years from now for the design and construction of new fish passage improvements at the **Freeman** United Water.

scenario. Three years also brings the deadline when United is scheduled to pay off their loan from the federal government for the Freeman **Diversion's** construction.

While the design and price of the fish passage improvements are not yet known, United would be advised to seek support from federal and state legislators in a position to provide funding from grants that are available for projects such as this

Congressman Elton Gallegly has been supportive of a much larger federal river project in Ventura County - the preparations for removal of **Matilija Dam** north of **Ojai** - and the funding it requires.

Senator Dianne Feinstein is the chair of an appropriations subcommittee in Washington DC, and is certainly in a position to bend her colleagues' ears on the Freeman Diversion fish passage improvements. A win-win scenario for all parties is certainly within reach.
What remains

to be seen is whether United will cooperate or will continue to try to avoid addressing the deficiencies of the existing fishladder. They have a long history of fighting improvements to their operations that would benefit Steelhead migration. They have missed every deadline in the lengthy, federally-mandated consultation process with NMFS on Steelhead passage at the Freeman Diversion. United has always managed Piru Creek and

the Santa Clara River merely as channels for cheaply conveying water from point A to point B. Ecological considerations seem beyond their understanding, certainly beyond their responsibility, although it is clear to most people that their operation of dams (migration barriers) in the Santa Clara River's watershed are the principal cause of the Steelhead's endangered status there.

That United is mainly interested in obfuscations, objections and delay is

supported in the final Biological Opinion, which takes a number of pages to refute 13 of United's comments on the earlier draft Biological Opinion.

The questions **United** brings up are the same issues they've raised with NMFS over the

past ten years. United has spent so much money on fighting successful improvements to fish passage at the Freeman **Diversion** that they recently announced an upcoming 40 percent increase in water payments by farmers on the Oxnard Plain that pump water diverted by the Freeman Diversion. While many farmers asked why they had received so little notice of this price hike, the first since 1992, the water diverted by the **Freeman** facility is still cheap by any California standards - \$15 per acre foot. The 40 percent increase will raise this price to \$21 per acre foot.

It would be far better for **United** to work in an expeditious and cooperative manner towards fish passage improvements at the Freeman Diversion.

Organizations working in support of the final Biological Opinion's requirements include CalTrout, Friends of the Santa Clara River, the Sierra Club, Los Padres ForestWatch and KSWC.

Soy - Santa Clara by Jess Victoria

How gratifying it was to read in the regional newspaper about the Ventura County Museum's latest exhibition dedicated to our still beautiful and glorious Santa Clara Valley. My 78-year love affair with this valley becomes more and more delicately tasteful and beautiful as I reflect upon the early and now the golden years of my life.

Years ago, the huge derrick-like tower that held the Richfield gasoline station sign was the beacon that informed travelers from the treacherous old road of the Fresno area, and those northbound from Los Angeles, that this, the Castaic Junction, was the beginning of the Santa Clara Valley, and westward, to the Pacific

Here too, the valley and the Santa Clara River join hands on their way west. The river flowing childlike, carefree, innocently to the rhythms of its natural pace, unencumbered, undetained by any man-made restrictions. Soon you would encounter the first of the fresh fruit and vegetable roadside stands along

Farther on you would pass a small road sign; that, with its arrow pointed to "Val Verde". As you left it behind, the emptiness and silence offered the time to reflect and wonder, what is it? A canyon? A town? Much later you would discover that this was a sanctuary for a community of African Americans from the Los Angeles area. Yes, this valley is marbled and variegated with the multicultured and multi-lingual people of the world. This Santa Clara Valley has love and tolerance for all.

Another small sign would tempt you to stretch your vision in hopes of catching a glimpse of Alessandro and Ramona. For you were now in the vicinity of the Camulos Ranch, whose peace and tranquility seduced Helen Hunt Jackson writing her world famous novel, "Ramona".

Soon you would encounter the hot air currents coming down from the yet virgin Piru Canyon, and pushing its creek to join and enhance the force of the Santa Clara River.

The Texas refinery would then welcome you into the friendly community of Fillmore, where people passing through were told not to wink or they would miss it. Not so, for it too had a creek, the Sespe creek. Which it was also another contributor to the Santa Clara River. The San Francisquito Dam disaster, unfortunately and merciless, gave this city a tragic day in our history.

The entrance to the Rancho Sespe was the next point of interest, for this was another home for those who labored in the citrus industry. If you were to enter one of these labor camps, the first sound you would hear would be that of Spanish music, happy and loud. The chatter of the comadres together with the laughter of children. Definitely told you, you were in one of the many labor camps that littered this valley with song, tears, and laughter. n June 27, Los Padres Forest Supervisor Peggy Hernandez agreed to changes in the *Ojai* Community Defense Zone that were proposed by Los Padres ForestWatch and Keep Sespe Wild in their May 9, joint appeal of the fuelbreak project.

joint appeal of the fuelbreak project.

The *Ojai Community Defense Zone* had originally called for 3,860 acres (six square miles) of fuelbreaks protecting the *Ojai Valley* from fires approaching from within **Los Padres Forest** west and north of *Ojai*.

These fuelbreaks were proposed to "vary in width from 300 feet up to 2,000 feet." The 3,860 proposed total acreage to be cleared was based on an average fuelbreak width of 600 feet, over 50 linear miles. The conservation groups' appeal called into question proposed fuelbreaks over 300 feet wide because evidence was not presented by the Forest Service to demonstrate their greater effectiveness in firefighting, and because of unnecessary loss of habitat, as well as the expense to clear and keep clear fuelbreaks up to 2,000 feet in width, over many years.

A secondary point that was also settled from the appeal was the Forest Service's proposal to authorize the clearing by homeowners of brush up to 1,000 feet from their homes onto adjacent National Forest lands. Current County and State fire clearance requirements for homeowners in high-fire areas range from 100 feet to 200 feet. The appeal settlement reduces the proposed maximum allowed homeowner clearances from 1,000 feet down to 300 feet

It's not very often we can say we've helped to save a million dollars of tax-payer funding - every few years. This is based on the saving of nearly 2,000 acres of ongoing mechanical clearing, at an estimated cost of \$500 per acre at today's prices.

The total proposed fuelbreak clearing was reduced in the appeal settlement from 3,860 to 2,032 acres, with the lower acreage representing a new average fuelbreak width of 300 feet over 50 linear miles (which equals 40 acres per linear mile). Fuelbreaks of up to 300 feet wide have protected **Ojai** from forest fires for many decades.

Many of the 2000' wide proposed fuelbreaks would have been very visible

from around the Ojai Valley. The appeal also eliminated the Forest Service's use of discing and brush raking in fuelbreak clearing. These options are very disturbing to the landscape, and were not likely to be used by the agency.

Coffee Brewing Rules

by Lorraine Mariz

robably the most frequently asked question at **Java & Joe** is "How do I get my coffee to taste like yours?"
Here is the answer to that question.
First, the obvious - Use good coffee.
Although any coffee will be drinkable if you follow all the other. if you follow all the other instructions



tryou follow all the other instructions here, you will get the best results if you use 100 percent **Arabica**.

Use the right grind for your brewing method. Course for **French Press**, medium for hand drip, medium fine for auto-drip and fine for espresso.

This may sound like sacrilege but I think that it is better to have coffee ground at the store. The high professional

to have coffee ground at the store. The big, professional grinders give a more uniform grind than home grinders. However, if you like grinding your own beans have a bit of your coffee ground at the store so you can see what the grounds should look like. Also some people are using too fine a ground for drip coffee makers. The theory is that with a finer grind you can use less coffee but I feel this makes the drip too slow and results in bitter coffee.

Brew time should equal the amount of coffee you are

Brew time should equal the amount of coffee you are brewing. For example if you are brewing a full, 10 cup pot it should take 10 minutes to brew. If the brew time is longer the grind is too fine; if it is shorter the grind is too Use cold, good water. If you don't drink the tap water don't use it to make coffee. Often just using filtered water makes the difference between good and mediocre coffee. If you use an auto-drip coffee maker make sure it is clean. Again the 10 cup 10 minute rule applies. If the brew time is too long and your grind is correct there is probably hard water build up in the pipes. You can clean the coffee maker with vinegar (Cheap, but very smelly), CLR (works really well but you have to rinse a lot), or stuff called "Mr. Coffee Cleaner" (for my money the easiest). If your water is very hard you may need to clean as often as every 2 weeks. Use the right amount of coffee. The rule is 1 round

tablespoon for 6 ounces of water (the standard cup on an auto-drip brewer). You may adjust this to taste.

Store coffee correctly. Grounds and beans are best in

an airtight container at room temperature. Grounds are fresh for about 2 weeks, beans for about 4 weeks. Coffee will stay fresh in an airtight container in the freezer for 6 months but you have to leave it there. Taking coffee in and out of the freezer causes condensation and bitterness. If you want to buy a lot of coffee at a time, freeze most if it and take out enough for 10 days or so.

Do not let coffee sit on the hot plate of an auto-drip

brewer! This is my pet peeve. Drink the coffee right away or use a thermal carafe. Also do not re-heat coffee in a microwave. Microwaving coffee changes its molecular structure (really) and makes it taste very bad. If you must re-heat coffee use a sauce pan on the stove but do not let it



ello again, Ventura County computer users! We received a great response from last month's tech article; readers from all over Ventura and Ojai Emailed us many great

tech questions. Keep 'em coming! Here's some of our favorites:

Defrosting a Frozen Computer

Q: If the computer is frozen is it harmful to turn it off using the power button or unplugging it?

- Robyn, Ojai, CA **A:** Computers, just like all creatures of the plan-

et, sometimes get stubborn and simply refuse to act in a rational manner. When this happens, your best bet is to hold down the Power Button for 5 seconds. This drains the computer of all life, and forces it to shut down. The recommended method is to click on the Shutdown option on your computer, so only do this as a last resort. A good rule of thumb: tap the CAPS LOCK key. If it lights up on your keyboard, it is not completely frozen and you should be able to shut it down normally. If the CAPS LOCK key is unresponsive, then it's brain dead and needs a hard smack. We recommend to never yank the power out of the computer while its running.

Internet Scams Q: How do I respond to those poor folks in **Lagos**, **Nigeria** that had their father die before he could get his \$15 million out of the country? They sound like they need help and are willing to

Traveling with a Laptop
Q: When Traveling, What do I need to access the Internet? Mary – Ojai, CA

A: All new laptops have built in wireless capability. So check ahead and make sure the hotel you plan on staying at has free Wi-Fi access. If they have Ethernet access (this is prior to the advent of wireless) you will need an Ethernet cable to plug your computer directly into their network.



Jess Victoria Says City Council Out of Touch With Business

My dad started this Photos, © 2008, Joel Anderson business in 1928. He was living in **Limoneira** at the labor camp. He saved 200 dollars in gold coins, because they used to get paid in gold coins back then and he went

to Los Angeles to buy his tools and supplies to start his shoe business.

Jess inherited the family business. Recently he was cited by the city for the shoe display (*pictured top, left*). "For over 30 years I have had this display here...every day I put it out and every evening I bring it in. Then on Saturday Aug. 2nd two clerks were sent over here either by Mr. Stewart of Miss Teresa Young to cite me for a code violation. Then, a

week later they show up again...

"That display brings me business....the other day a nice young couple stopped in and bought a pair of shoes for 25 bucks

- 25 bucks for a nice pair of Justin boots....twenty five bucks is twenty five bucks you know.... those 25 bucks add up for me,"

Victoria said.

"These people at the city council are so far removed from what business is. This city council is the most unfriendly to business of any we have ever had.... I asked them if they were citing anyone else and they said, "no"... They're after me because I go and complain to the city council....
"Well...authority doesn't like to be challenged. The **Constitution** says I have a right to face my accusers.... so if someone

sends these turkeys over I have a right to know who sent them. I went to the city council, and then after the meeting I sent a letter requesting a review... this is a formal request for a review and hearing. Their response, according to this letter from the city, '...after review of the previous statement citation it has hereby been vacated'.... So I won... but it was harassment....The city should be here saying "how can we help you"...instead they come and harass people... You know I was the first Grand Marshall 3-years ago for the Santa Paula Labor Day Parade....

We have elections coming up for council seats... now this is the time to clean house....!



Several Ventura County Unions were represented at the parade, including; the American Postal Workers Union – Channel Islands Area Local #589, United Association of Plumbers, Steamfitters, Welders & Apprentices – Ventura Local #484, Laborers' International Union – Ventura Local #385, Laborers' International Union of North America, the Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters (under the umbrella of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America).

the narrow streets of **London**, the event of the **Horse** "Tamer" evolved as a sort of traveling circus with

practical application. People would bring their problem horses to the Tamer who would for a fee try to correct the disobedience so that the horse could continue to earn it's keep. True horse training takes time and patience and the only reason that the Horse **Tamer** evolved in the late 1800s was that the small cab owners whose business depended on the tractable horse simply did not have the time or money to invest in horse training.

The gifted horse **Tamer** (there were a few) was an individual who could look at a horse and make a quick judgment on the psychological make up of the renegade horse. Was it an oversensitive horse who only required patience and understanding or was it an overbearing, dominant horse who would only understand the presence of a superior physical force?

Sadly, the lure of money collected from spectators by the horse taming traveling shows motivated many of the less honest "tamers" to become fascinated with the entertainment aspect of horse taming. More and more these shows became a sideshow of "challenges" such as the taming of a zebra or the challenge of confronting an infamous horse for larger and larger sums of money turning the traveling horse taming tents into a circus show.

ave you ever had a really rich meal or gone out for that killer burger and fries and no matter how gooooood it tasted, you would get an unsettled feeling in your stomach? Rich food and or bad combining, and your tummy really complains. The same

thing can happen to your horse. And since your horse can't tell you in so many words that his or her tummy is upset it is up to you to figure it out. Rich hay (alfalfa) or hay tha is cut too wet or cut at the wrong time can cause upsets. Also can too much grain, stress, trailering, deworming or anything that is out of the norm for your horse.

Some horses show tummy problems by getting upset at feeding

time. They may lay their ears back, gnash or grind their teeth and some may even kick at the fence, stall walls or even their neighbor. The reason for this could be what they are fed, if they have a grumpy neighbor, if it has been a long time since their last meal, ulcers or their digestion. Most of the time it is their digestion.

Horses are defiantly creatures of habit. When they hear you start your normal feeding routine their bodies start to prepare for food. If their gut is not properly nourished or if they have been stressed, the acid they produce getting ready to eat can cause damage to their stomach. This might be a time you should consult you veterinarian if something like this is happening consistently as your

horse may be developing ulcers.

There are a few natural things you can do to help your horses with their digestion. You can give them 1/2 to 1 oz. of whole apple organic vinegar, the kind you can find in you local health food store. And remember

> buy at the grocery store that is clear brown or just clear. It really needs to be the kind that is cloudy and made from whole apples: then you get all the real food value from the apple and all the minerals they contain. You can also use a probiotic that can help settle the digestion down and to help it work properly. Just make sure you get a high quality one; that is going to work. Otherwise it will just end up in the poop pile.

Bentonite Clay can be given for calming an upset tummy. I have used this for myself and my horses. The clay must be wet to the consistency of mustard and given between meals. If this is not possible, just get it in them it will help. I will give a few product suggestions at the end of this article.

Certain clays and other products can also assist in detoxing. Today we are all bombarded with toxins of all kinds, car emissions, chlorine in our water, chemical fertilizers. pest repellents...... get the picture..... they are everywhere. You can help your horses by putting them on plain grass hay, plain grain- COB- corn, oats and barley with no

water for drinking and you may see your horse turn around pretty quickly. Just plain normal food is good for all of us, even our critters. It can help the body heal and dump some of the stuff it has needed to dump for a long time. Simple food is the easiest for the body to digest and normally has the nutrients we need. Remember from one of my earlier articles that horses were designed to eat very simply.....grasses, local chaparral, herbs if they can find them and minerals that they could dig up and eat out of the dirt. All of these help the horse balance in their quest to digest what we give them.

Just a cautionary note: sometimes when a horse or human starts to detox, some odd things could start to happen such as: the itchies, a runny nose or eyes or a past health challenge may return that has not been fully addressed. Even though this may not seem right it is a sign that your horse did have a build-up of toxins and it is best to support and continue or they could show up as a more


severe health problem later. Consult your veterinarian if your horse has medical problems.

Some of the products I have used that have helped my horses are from Dynamite Marketing and Waiora. Dynamite Marketing has DynaPro for digestion, Miracle Clay for detox and settling tummys. Excel for detox and helping digestion. All of these products need to be used as stated on the labels. Waiora has Natural Cellular Defense (NCD) for detoxing, using it as stated on the product insert. These products need to be used with a good natural and balanced nutritional program.

GIVE 'EM THE BIRD

h Tweety! How you led us on! If every companion bird was as intelligent, neat, healthy and clean as that lisping delight, the bird might well have surpassed Labradors as the pet of choice.

Here are a few things **Tweety** didn't tell: Companion birds are generally divided into two categories: softbill and hookbill. The former group has the finches, canaries, doves, chickens, and so forth. Yes, a chicken can be a companion bird.

Hookbills are the macaws, amazons, conures, cocka-

toos, cockatiels, and parakeets. Along the road from the prehistoric era. there have been as many divergences as there have been environmental niches to fill. Of course there have been dropouts (by human or by nature) like the Passenger pigeon and the Carolina parrot (I might also ask a moment of silence for the Monserrat Oriole, which to the best of my knowledge has not been seen since the volcano on that island spewed.) The thing to remember is that many niches have different needs. Tweety, as you might remember, lived in substandard conditions: small cage and a constant animal (cat) hazard but still managed to be glowingly healthy and chipper. Amazing adaptability.

The good news is that diversity does allow sufficient variation that there

should be something for almost everyone*. The bad news is that you will still need to RESEARCH needs and personality BEFORE you get a bird. YOU will need to clean. YOU will need to provide a good diet, clean water, adequate light and ventilation, properly sized cage/ enclosure, security, and companionship. Tweety cleaned his own digs and had simple emotional needs. Birds are flock creatures generally, and the need for some interaction is lost on people who regard them as decorator items. That **macaw** is a gorgeous and colorful addition to your living space, but it will destroy any woodwork it can get its beak on. Even a **cockatiel** can modify furniture, given the opportunity. Cockatoos need a lot of interaction and are prone to feather – plucking and self-mutilation if their social needs are not adequate. I am sure all my neighbors know I have a **conure** (real flashy but noisy – like a sports car, right?) The messiest bird I have is my canary, which showed up on the doorstep two years ago and was (gratefully and easily) captured. That little bird spreads more feathers and seed than my African Grey parrot who loves to stand on the cage door and beat his wings until the feathers and dander are spread to all corners of the globe.

People with respiratory ailments or immune compromise should not have birds. Most birds have feather dust (combination of debris from the feathers and oils) that can cause irritation or a condition called "Birdkeeper's lung" among other problems. Birds themselves are airheads, an adaptation for flight. Their unique respiratory system makes them prone to problems with particulate matter in the air, smoke, fumes (no Teflon/nonstick pans around birds !!!), and diseases like tuberculosis.

The diet most birds eat in the wild is very hard to create in captivity. The bark, fruits, grasses, insects, vegetables, grains and other items that field studies have shown some species eat is not represented in seed mixes that have long been the mainstay of cage birds. Many of the items birds eat in the wild are seasonal additions that have been correlated with reproductive success. If you are a golden pheasant and you can't come up with a colorintense plumage and sizeable tail, well...no date, no sex, tough luck.

This is where pelleted diets are a big help. Birds are like kids who only want to eat one color goldfish cracker. Sometimes you need to make them eat their vegetables also. A good quality pelleted diet will be instrumental in getting all the nutrients into the bird in correct amounts. Other additional items depend on your bird's species. Parakeets, for example, are known to need iodine. Many of the conditions birds are seen for at a veterinary office are related to their diet.

Tweety was a very resourceful bird. Good thing too, since grandma was never around when Tweety was eluding a certain cat. Cats, dogs, ceiling fans, other birds, and juvenile humans can all be harmful or fatal. You need to keep your bird protected. Never run a ceiling fan when your bird is out of its cage. A good cage should be

easily cleaned, have a locking door, and have bar spacing appropriate for the bird's size. Birds should only be out under supervision. My uncle (thankfully briefly) shut his cockatiel in the freezer when the bird landed there while he was getting ice cubes. Be aware that cheap cages can be a source of toxicity if the powder coating is poor quality or if it is an antique cage that might have a lead-containing paint. Stainless steel cages are the most ideal. Birds can be microchipped, but many a lost bird has not survived the mean streets and trees.

Some of these aspects are still present in modern day "clinics" which have elevated many mediocre horse trainers to rock star status with the accompanying incomes.

Everyone wants to be someone, so if you can't earn a reputation through your own accomplishments in the show ring you can always put on your war paint (if you're exploiting the native Indian angle) or your chaps (the Cowboy mystic) and declare yourself a horse whisperer to the throngs of bored Sunday riders. Add a little mysticism, a little sex appeal (moustache and cowboy hat is a nice touch), and go straight to Poster boy status.

Blame the American Media too... I have yet to see a really good horse movie come out of the United States in the last 20 years. I am appalled at the message of the much touted Horse Whisperer...as far as I can see the message is buy your child a horse who is "too much horse", don't monitor its use and then when an accident happens, you call in a good ol' boy horse trainer who chases the beast around, ties up it's foreleg and sits on it while it lies nose down in the dirt. Sounds more like shouting than whispering to me! Of course the appeal here is that the horse then magically does everything the rider desires without the rider having to go through the long and proven trail of actually rebuilding the horse's trust and confidence.

In **Hidalgo** the message is even worse. A drunk cowboy takes a horse that is not conditioned, rides it up onto an ocean liner because he's too lazy to walk and then rides the beast to exhaustion, only to take the saddle off (I was already yelling this directive at the TV screen) and ride a victory lap on a horse that a few minutes early was lying in a heap of foamy sweat near death. Where's the message here? Yes... horses do die of over exertion. It seems like every year a few drop dead at the Calgary Stampede and back in the old days of the **Pony Express** it was pretty common for horses ridden beyond their conditioning to be put up and found dead in their stalls by morning.

Where in all this is respect being taught for the age old art of horsemanship and the responsibility for caring for a fragile creature of flight? In an age of instant gratification, trainers everywhere are constantly having to deal with the

unrealistic aspirations of their clients and it's a thin line between keeping the enthusiasm of the gung ho kid rider in tact and yet protecting them from injury and loss of confidence. It's easier to keep confidence in the rider than to restore it

to restore it lazing in the sun, they are completed after it is lost. A good horse trainer understands this just as a diving coach doesn't send a student off the high platform just because, in their abundance of youthful confidence, they think they want to try it.

Next time you want to pop some corn and sit down to a good horse movie try the **Australian** made **Phar Lap** or the

Dog Walking Etiquette Mastering the Walk

by Evelyn Framont

I prefer a six foot leash and choke chain or a prong collar if your dog is really strong. Avoid the flexi-leash as you have no control and you're teaching your dog to lead rather than follow.
 I alternate between walking my dog at my left side (heel)

and letting her "range" as in "sniff and pee".

3) When approaching another dog, make sure your dog's attention is on you! Do not allow your dog to pull, lunge, or rush to say 'hi.'

4) If you decide to let your dog off leash, be sure that you have mastered the Recall. Does your dog come when you call? If not, keep them on a leash!

5) If your dog is off leash, be sure your dog comes when you call to attach the leash when a dog or human is approaching. The **Leash Law** will get you if there is ever an altercation.

6) Do not allow your dog to run up to people or other dogs, to chase small animals such as cats, squirrels or rabbits. If you can't control your dog's behavior then KEEP HIM ON A LEASH and call me!!!!

7) Lastly, make sure you always carry a plastic bag for cleaning up after your dog.
