### **Fixing California's Finances**

### California Economy Headed Down a Dead End Street or.... \_\_\_\_\_\_Art L. Isgur

If you are searching for a happy opinion article you are now advised to stop reading and search for another op-ed piece.

Almost nothing is certain, save uncertainty, when we deal with our state budget. It is quite easy to write that we, as a state, must pass a budget that includes meaningful tax increases with mega spending cuts. Everyone is willing to increase taxes, on someone else. Programs that benefit me, and people like me, are sacrosanct and therefore immune to budget slashes.

Let us start to look at this problem in a mature manner. The bottom 20 percent of state households earn less than one thousand dollars a month. There is nothing to tax there. The richest 1 percent of California families average more than \$1.5 million in income, annually. Now you know where to start looking for tax increases.

Let us be creative in the search for new, increased taxes. If you buy a typical newspaper you pay only forty-seven cents, plus three cents sales tax. Your friend goes to his/her favorite fast food eatery. They have super burritos for only ninetynine cents. Your bill is, however, one dollar six cents because...yes...a sales tax. We'll return to this a bit later.

The Republicans in the state legislature strongly oppose any tax increase. Their mantra is, "Cut, cut, cut." Fair enough ! Let us cut. We might cut, 100 percent, of the funding for California state universities and the University of California. That's correct, cut them out of our budget completely. But that still isn't enough to balance the budget ! Let us now look at some really large ideas - how about closing, for six full months, our vaunted prison system? Now that is a great idea, correct ? Just ask the GOP up in Sacramento. Here is another great idea that the Republicans will love: right after the Presidents' Day Holiday, (February 16, 2009), why not close all the public schools for the rest of the school year ?

Let us assume, for now, that the federal government would allow this, but how about slashing the state human services and health budgets by about...70 percent ?

If we follow the above Republican suggestions we could, just about, 'solve' our budget problem. Now we must do ALL of these, or at least some combination of these budget reductions, or we will not be able to balance California's state budget even if we eliminated everything else in the budget ! How do you like them apples ?

In the 'old days' we would be looking at deficit funding of programs (fixing our roads, levees and bridges come to mind) designed to put people back to work. They would become tax producers rather than tax consumers.

The state would be modernized and in a far better position to compete in this century. We can't do that ! Why ? Well we, you and me, and Gov. Schwarzenegger, passed umteen billions of dollars in bonds to balance previous budgets, (think of this as using a credit card to pay off other debts.) We are now 'maxed out'. We have no more credit. We can't borrow a thin dime from anybody.

So...we cannot borrow to solve our fis-



cal problems. We are not going to close all the public universities in California. Likewise we are not about to open the gates of the state prisons. We can hope that the Obama Administration will help bail out California but rather than waiting to see if the US Senate will be able to stop a GOP fillibuster in April, (by which time we might well be in economic quicksand), we just might consider a ... a ... tax increase, an income surcharge on the wealthiest 15 percent of families in the state. Along with some moderate budget reductions, this is a plan that just might get us to a promised land of reasonable taxes and reasonable expenditures. But that might be a topic for another day. Hopefully we can solve one problem at a time.

## Global Warming Update: China/US Show Increases

he start of a new year is a good time to look at developments concerning global warming over the past 12 months.

While the topic has certainly stayed central in the minds of many citizens and policy-makers around the world, scientific studies have revealed up-to-date assessments of the risks posed by global warming to the ecological systems that support our resource-intensive lifestyles. The assess-ments are not good

ments are not good. Over much of the past decade, climate scientists have

estimated that global warming could be limited to a 2 degrees centigrade increase, if global warming emissions were brought under early control and reduced. Emissions have however risen in recent years at a faster rate than ever, and some scientists now say it will be impossible to prevent an estimated 4.3 degrees centigrade of warming. Bear in mind that the last time the planet was 5 degrees warmer was 35-55 million years ago, when swampy forests were the predominant vegetation, and alligators lived close to the North Pole.

A climate change study released in early December, which took two years to complete, was produced by the US Climate Change Science Center. As well as predicting long-term drying of the Southwestern US, it foresees global sea levels rising by 4 feet this century. This means goodbye to hundreds of cities worldwide as we now know them, from New York to London and Miami, and disastrous losses of human living space in densely populated countries such as **Bangladesh**.

What's more, this recent study sounds an alarm about the risk of abrupt climate changes, which are predicted to occur when particular "tipping points" are reached. One example of a tipping point is when the **Arctic Ice Sheet** melts so much that the exposed dark mass of sea water absorbs enough solar heat that it does not freeze over again. (This is in contrast to a glaring white ice cap, which reflects the solar heat back into the atmosphere.) A tipping point marks a permanent shift to a new set of climate conditions.

Tom Armstrong, a senior advisor for global change programs at the US Geological Survey, stated that "there are really no policies in place to deal with abrupt climate change

#### CHINA OVERTAKES THE US

Several developed nations managed to reduce their carbon dioxide emissions in 2007, including **Denmark** (8 percent), the UK and Germany (3 percent), and France and Australia (2 percent). On the other hand, US emissions rose by 2 percent. Those in China and India, two emerging industrialized nations, also rose steeply; in China's case by 7.5 percent, which is equivalent to one half of the 2007 worldwide increase. China is now the world's largest emitter of carbon dioxide.

Another problem is that the planet's oceans and forests, which were able to absorb a whopping 57 percent of carbon dioxide emissions between 1959 and 2000, are now absorbing only 54 percent of these emissions. In other words, they are getting maxed out in terms of their ability to absorb excess carbon dioxide, which is increasingly going to stay in the atmosphere instead, and speed up global warming.

Benjamin Santer, an atmospheric scientist at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory calls it "kind of scary" that the recent growth in worldwide carbon

dioxide emissions exceeds the highest growth predicted only two years ago by the International Panel on Climate Change.

A global climate change conference in Poland in December produced "the bare minimum of what we needed for the talks," according to Jennifer Haverkamp with the Environmental Defense Fund. Several developing nations offered concrete plans to cut back their carbon dioxide emissions - including Mexico and South Africa. Brazil committed to reduce deforestation by 70 percent by 2017 – deforestation being responsible for about 20 percent of global carbon dioxide emissions.

Unresolved were basic questions of equitably balancing emissions cuts between rich and poor nations. The conference in **Poland** was a stepping stone towards a new international climate change treaty in December of 2009

### AL GORE'S FIVE-POINT PLAN

In a November opinion piece in the New York Times, Al Gore spelled out his five-point plan to repower America, with a commitment to providing 100 percent of our electricity from carbon-free sources within 10 years. This plan would also result in a large degree of independence from overseas sources of oil and gas. Firstly, the **Obama Administration** and **Congress** should offer large-scale incentives for solar, wind and geothermal energy sources. Second, we should plan and build a unified, nationwide 'smart grid" for the distribution of renewable electricity from its rural sources to the cities where it's needed. The cost would be around \$400 billion over 10 years

Third, we should convert the nation's automobile industry to build plug-in hybrids to run on renewable electricity. This has the added benefit of the hybrid vehicles being charged overnight, during off-peak hours

Fourth, we should get going on nationwide programs to make our buildings more energy-efficient. About 40 percent of carbon dioxide emissions in the US are from the energy needs of buildings for heating, cooling, and lighting.

Fifth and lastly, we should put a price on the burning of carbon fuels, to encourage greater investments in clean energy both nationally and internationally. This would include programs to slow deforestation worldwide. CALIFORNIA CONTINUES TO LEAD THE WAY

In December, California's Air Resources Board unanimously approved a 134-page plan to reduce our state's global warming emissions by 15 percent from today's levels by 2020. The plan would require one third of **California's** electricity to come from renewable sources – far more than any other state has pledged till now. More than 43,000 comments were received by the Air Resources Board in the 18 months of public hearings that went into the new plan. Cuts to automobile carbon emissions are slated for 31 percent; cuts through energy efficiency, improved appliances and green buildings will total 20 percent; cap-and-trade transactions to foster greener energy will save 34 percent over current usage.

Details of the plan include incentives for local governments to reduce urban sprawl (which requires more car trips); capturing methane at landfills; the manufacture of much more efficient vehicles; and using less energy to transport and to treat water is a key factor – currently this uses up 20 percent of all the energy used in the state !

It's anybody's guess whether California's ambitious plans can spur the world to a greener future in time to stop severe changes to our planet's ecosystems that will threaten agriculture and the economy. **California's** energy use – although equivalent to the world's eighth largest economy – is still only 1.5 percent of the global total. *THE END OF OUR FULL-SPEED AHEAD CONSUMER CULTURE* It would be nice to think that concerned policy-mak-

ers were moving as one to address worsening global climate change. In fact, the inertia of business as usual is enormous - the global corporate machinery that devours the planet's minerals, forests and crops to design, manufacture and transport the plethora of consumer goods we believe we need. Politicians are still largely beholden to political contributions from the oil and gas and defense industries, though the reality of our situation requires a speedy shifting of government subsidies from these

industries towards major green infrastructure programs. Let's look at it this way – at a growth rate of 3 percent, the global economy doubles each 23 years. **Professor** Rod Smith of the UK's Royal Academy of Engineering has shown that "each successive doubling period

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consumes as much resources as all the previous doubling periods combined."

In other words, a 3 percent growth rate between now and 2041 will consume as much natural resources of all sorts, as has been used by all humanity up until 2008. Obviously the goal of incessant growth is up against limited amounts of available natural resources, as well as the risks of global climate change. Herman Daly's book "Steady State Economics" is a good place to look further into how economics work at the end of growth as we have known it.

IS THE RECESSION A TIMELY NUDGE IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION? If the richer nations are to drastically lessen their use of energy and resources over the coming decades, in order to limit the growth of global warming, people must first learn to focus their financial resources on what they really need, rather than what advertising has persuaded them to purchase.

It is interesting that the current recession is upon us exactly when it is vital to reduce the fossil fuel energy we consume daily. Perhaps the recession can serve as a reminder of what is more important than the quantity of stuff we surround ourselves with, whose manufacture is causing the planet to overheat.

Certainly, incoming President Obama seems set to focus more determinedly on the problem of global warming than has **President Bush**. His choice for Secretary of Energy, Nobel-prize winning Steve Chu, is someone who takes climate change seriously. WHAT ARE WE TO DO?

The list of ways to reduce your carbon footprint is long enough to allow plenty of leeway for approaching the problem in your own way.

First, there's your house, which on average consumes 40 percent of our energy in the US. Replacing older ap-pliances, as they wear out, with the most efficient models is straightforward. Having an energy audit of your home can reveal numerous ways to stop wasting energy. Invest in solar electric panels on your roof.

Second, your transportation energy, which is the next largest chunk of your individual energy consumption. Basically, try to drive less and carpool, or use mass transit or a bicycle more. Then there's flying, still the fastest growing transportation choice. It's crazy to be expanding airports at a time of runaway climate change. Help reverse this trend by flying a lot less often, and for shorter distances

Third, there's the energy it takes to produce the food and goods you purchase. Buying locally grown foods is a great alternative. Avoid buying summer fruits and vegetables in wintertime, which are often shipped many thousands of miles. Buying more fresh foods also avoids the energy used to process and wrap and ship all the packaged foods in the supermarket.

Step away from the addiction to stuff, whether gadgets, clothes, or whatever. And talk to your family and friends to spread the word. FOCUS ON THE LOCAL

While global climate change can seem too enormous a problem to confront, a lot of the solutions are local in nature and lend themselves to local activism. Locally, we can support producers of fresh fruits and vegetables. We can support local initiatives to generate renewable energy, at the household and/or community level. We can work to make public transportation more plentiful and available. We can support recycling efforts, and the local reuse of the recycled materials collected locally. **Other Resources**

ast month I addressed the need to define the problem, prioritize, and formulate a solution. This month, I'll introduce a framework for evaluating solutions.

One of the biggest challenges with developing solutions is to ensure the proposed solution actually addresses the core problem and underlying causes. This sort of assumes the problem or objective is accurately and clearly defined as well as agreed upon.

Solution 1:

the big club warehouse stores.) The poster child for "way too much too late" is the **Sarbanes-Oxley Act** of 2002. It was passed after huge fraud failures: **Enron Debacle** (The largest corporate malfeasance in history whereby the magnitude of the fraud exceeded the entire annual dollar value of blue collar crime in the country.) **Tyco International, Adelphia**, **Peregrine Systems** and **WorldCom**, etc. In each of these cases, the cause wasn't a lack of rules or procedures; it was caused by circumventing the existing rules (high level management fraud and collusion with the auditors). See why it's important to define the problem and causes before you formulate a solution ?

**Sarbanes-Oxley** (SOX) not completely merit less; however, it comes closer to zero merit than to some reasonable merit. In its simplest form, SOX imposed a lot of redundant oversight committees, forms, and approvals/ signatures on publicly traded companies.

4) Retrospect Analysis: One of the best tools to analyze the effectiveness of a policy is to go back in time and evaluate whether it would have worked on the past problems it is purporting to solve.

The above corporate irregularities (a polite word for fraud) were perpetrated by high level executives and or the now defunct auditors of **Arthur Anderson**. Making a crook sign a piece of paper stating they are telling the truth is like leaving fresh meat on the counter and telling the dog not to eat just before you step out of the room. In an earlier article, I advocated to stipulate the CPC or Cost Per Citizen. It's easier for most folks to comprehend if they see how much it costs them personally. I stand behind this recommendation.

### **Treasure Hunters** by Richard Senate



he cable channels are filled with innovative programs probing the unknown. They have shows like Ghost Hunters, Monster Hunters and most recently UFO Hunters. I believe there is room for another show in this genre. I

would like to propose a new program called Treasure Hunters. The goal would be to investigate legends of lost treasures with a special focus on those with a link to terrible curses and ghosts! The idea would be to discover if the accounts of the treasure are real. Is the legendary loot fact or fancy '

I even have an ideal candidate for a pilot episode. One need not look to some distant island or some far away desert ghost town to find a compelling story. One haunted treasure is located right here in Ventura County ! The lost gold of the Olivas Adobe would make an ideal test case. The hidden wealth is estimated to be worth \$75,000 in gold coins (now worth 20 times more in today's dollars).

In 1855 the two-story Olivas Adobe in Ventura was the center of a vast cattle ranch, operated by the wealthy family of Don Raymundo Olivas. He became rich selling beef to the miners in the gold camps of the Mother Lode. That year a Yankee buyer came to the ranch and bought a herd of steers to be driven north. As each head of cattle was trotted passed the gate, a gold coin was tossed into Donna Teodora's apron.

That night bandits raided the house. They got the drop on the family and took the heavy bags of gold coins, and everything they could steal, even pausing to rip the gold earrings out of **Teodora's** ears! The bandits escaped heading north. An angry Don Raymundo gathered a posse of local ranchers and went after the gang. They were heading north towards Santa Barbara and two were caught.

When questioned they said the gold was buried but refused (or they didn't know) to say where the treasure was buried. Their silence bought them

only a slow death at the end of a rope. Because the gold was so heavy, it was hidden so the outlaws could escape. Legends say it was buried someplace on Red Mountain, near Foster Park. Some accounts even say the leader of the bandits was the notorious bad man, Joaquin Murrieta. Some say his ghost guards the treasure even to this very day.

Maps showing the treasure site do exist, but over the years three men who went looking for the gold have died under mysterious circumstances. The most recent deaths took place in the 1930s when two men drove off a cliff. Were they, as some speculate, driven off the road by a ghost of **Murrieta** on his spectral horse a

The Olivas Family never recovered their lost gold but they were able to recoup their losses in just a few months. The real question is: does the treasure really exist ?

Many family accounts tell of the great robbery and it is listed in a Los Angeles newspaper. This implies that a robbery did happen. The stories of Murrieta can be discounted as the date of the robbery is 1855 and Joaquin Murrieta was gunned down by lawmen in 1853. He could not have committed the crime as he was dead. The Los Angeles papers point to a lesser known, but equally vicious, outlaw named Encarnation Berryessa. Perhaps the similarity in names may account for the error. **Berryessa** met his end in

Los Angeles at the end of a rope, so he may not have returned to the Ventura area to recover his loot.

Was it possible for **Don Raymundo** to have made such a sum on the sale of one herd of cattle? Yes, tax records say he could have raised 1,000 head of cattle on the lands he owned (he was leasing lands even in the Ojai Valley). Cattle was selling for \$75 a head in 1855 so it is possible that he could have made such an amount in one sale. The gold would have been in the form of

thick octagon-

shaped coins worth \$25 each.

That would have

meant that three

coins would have been dropped into

Teodora's apron.

If it was only one,

that would place the treasure at only

\$25,000, still a

great amount of

gold.

The Priest came to **Ventura** with his shovel only to find the trees had been cut down or the directions were somehow wrong.

Perhaps metal detection equipment might find the gold or the pistols. The whole of **Red Mountain** today is all private property and permission should be secured before setting foot on the property. Never trespass for any reason and remember the terrible curse

Visit the Olivas Adobe in Ventura and get the whole story of the great robbery and the speculation as to the location of the lost gold. The story is a good one and, with re-enactments and the input of psychics and professional treasure hunters, it would make a great TV show.

With higher air pollution standards reaping some benefits in the form of cleaner air for all of us, the council has apparently decided that's the green light to pack more houses into town. More houses = more people = more car traffic = more smog, right back to where we started ...

Redevelopment consultant for the City of Ojai, Tom Figg said at the **Dec. 2 Ojai City Council Meeting**, "Population growth and air quality are not necessarily correlated with one another. What we've seen because of more arduous regulatory standards on emissions is that the population has grown consid-erably over the last 10-15 years and yet air quality has improved greatly, and so it's hard to make a direct connection to say that additional housing is going to translate to diminished air quality because that's not what the numbers suggest. There's plenty of land available....435 units Ojai next cycle..."

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## Helping Our Children Grow: Opportunities Versus "Mistakes"

e often have parents ask us what they can do when their children become upset with mistakes. For example, recently, a mom reported that her son became very upset when he took a quiz and missed one question. He did not focus on the 9 out of 10 that were correct. but on the one that he missed. He didn't think he should be making any mistakes at all !

This can be a tricky issue. We need to examine our own actions, behaviors, and statements to see if we are contributing to the child reacting in this way. Many parents say that it's not coming from them - they are always positive and talk in terms of how many questions or problems a student gets right. That may be but are we giving them messages in other ways during daily life that suggest that "mistakes" are "bad"? After all, we all grew up with the idea that the best score is 100 percent and the best grade is A+. If your children are in a traditional school program, this is certainly the message they are getting there.

We also need to realize that the word "test" in itself gives the idea that the student will be "measured" – and that the score determines how "good" or "smart" you are. This is a major reason why tests fail to teach or to be positive motivators in most students' lives. They are usually associated with feelings of stress or fear, and often lead to disappointment, sadness, and beliefs of inadequacy.

In contrast, let's look at people who perceive "mistakes" in a very different way. For example, it is said that Thomas Edison did over 1000 experiments trying to invent the light bulb. He was asked how he could keep going after making so many mistakes. His response: What mistakes? Each time I'm just learning what doesn't work, bringing me closer to what does work. Similarly, the most successful sales people look forward to being turned down by potential clients. Their reasoning: the more no's I get the closer I am to a big "YES."

These people are not seeing mistakes - they are seeing learning opportunities ! Many of our best inventions - styrofoam, post-it notes, etc. – started out as "mistakes." The person involved was trying to do something else and something went wrong - lucky for us, someone saw beyond the mistake and a new invention was born. All of our famous inventors scientists, and creative people made lots of mistakes – this is the only way they could get to the discovery they were looking for, by being willing to get it "wrong' so many times.

It's important to get this concept across



requirement for learning is safety. If our students do not feel emotionally safe to explore, try, and take risks in their learning, their potentials will not be realized. For example, there are so many kids who stop asking questions in the classroom or who don't raise their hands to participate because they are afraid of saying the

wrong thing or saying something "stupid." In order to be successful at anything, including learning, you have to be willing to make mistakes. It's the "fail your way to the top" attitude: if I keep trying, discovering, experimenting, I'll get there. This is what separates the people who achieve their goals from those who don't. In her book, "Work Less Make More," Jennifer White says, "Fail often so you can succeed sooner."

The more we can see "mistakes" as opportunities and incorporate this concept into our everyday family life, the better it will be for our kids. One way to get help with this is to read stories together of people who turned mistakes into opportunities. There are several books on this subject. If you go to Amazon.com and put "mistakes" in the search box, you will get a whole list. Here are a few to get you started:

If parents and teachers continually point out what students are doing "right" and if "mistakes" are treated as learning opportunities rather than "problems," students will get the idea. Wouldn't it be great if our kids could grow up seeing opportunities all around them ?!

A new year is beginning....despite what is going on around us, what if we make a decision to coach our kids to see the opportunities presented in every situation ? That seems to be a New Year's Resolution worth making !

don't, or rarely, do a critique on a restaurant. However, once in a while you happen on a restaurant where the food, the ambience, the employees, and the owners are so in tune with each other, the beauty of the place deserves recognition.

The other day my wife and I were driving around the **Channel Islands Harbor** when I spotted a sign that said "Just Opening" it related to a new restaurant by the name of "**Moqueca**". It is a true **Brazilian** restaurant that has only opened a couple of weeks ago. Usually I make it a rule to not try new restaurants until they have been around for at least 6 months. But this one really looked inviting, besides my wife and I are real fans of **Mexican** food so we decided, what the hey, we had never tried **Brazilian** food and a friend of ours who has traveled to **Brazil** a few times has always told us the food was to die for, so lets give it a try.

I really got to tell you, it was one of the best decisions we have made this entire year. As soon as we walked into the restaurant, we were impressed with the beautiful decor (designed by the Owner Chef herself), Linen table cloths, china plates and sparkling silverware, the place was immaculate.

We were seated by one of the owners, (a full family establishment), on the enclosed patio overlooking the harbor, (by the way the restaurant is on the second floor in a newly built building, the old one burned down), just before you reach the Whales Tail. Moqueca, 3550 S. Harbor Blvd in Channel Islands Harbor, phone, 204-0970 and they even have a website where you can see the entire menu, www.moquecarestaurant.com

We met most of the owners, they were all gracious and very helpful in selecting a dish. My wife, not being as adventuresome with food as I am, opted to order a **Brazilian** version of **Chicken Stroganoff**. She couldn't say enough good things about it. I love seafood, any kind of seafood, so I ordered **Arrozo De Polvo**, **Paella Style White Rice** cooked with small pieces of extremely tender **Octopus** cooked in an earthenware crock with **Baby Broccoli**, **Tomatoes**, **Onions**, **Cilantro** and the **Essence** of **Urucum**, which is a **Brazilian** jungle fruit. I asked if they had a **Brazilian** hot sauce and they smiled and said sure. They brought me a small dish of extremely small chilies which should only be eaten one at a time with lots of food.... Both of these dishes were to die for....

Of course I just had to try a **Brazilian** beer, they have both light and dark beers. I ordered the light one called **Bahima**, excellent choice. When I had finished the beer I, of course, had to try a famous **Brazilian** cocktail made with **Cachaca** called *Caipirinha*. It is made with limes and is reminiscent of a **Mojito**, again excellent choice. We had to try a desert, so my wife ordered a **Pave De BomBom**, crumbs of chocolate, (real chocolate) with layers of milk flan and **Chantilly Cream**. I went for the **Mousse De Maracuja**; it is a absolutely heavenly **Passion Fruit Mousse**.

We spent a couple of hours at the restaurant and when we left it was with the promise to ourselves that we would return and very soon. Do yourself a favor and amble on over to the **Channel Islands Harbor** for one of the finest eating experiences you will ever have.

"I have lived with several Zen Masters – all of them cats." – Eckhart Tolle, The Power of Now

by Suza Francina y cats gathered around and purred their approval as I read *Choosing to Be* by **Ojai author Kat Tanzy**. I was a bit under the weather when this book landed on my doorstep, so mostly I read in bed, under the covers, usually with one cat settled at the top of my head, one curled around my feet and one against my chest. I am certain that both the healing energy of my nice warm cats and the reading of this calming, quieting book, hastened my recovery.

*Choosing to Be* revolves around a wise Maine Coon cat named Poohbear Degoonacoon, his kitten muse Catzenbear, and author Kat Tansey. These three characters take the reader on a journey from the depths of depression to the freedom of Buddha mind.

**Kat Tansey** has worn many hats in her life. She is a writer and life coach for women at midlife (and beyond) who want to transform and re-energize their lives. She has been a meditation practitioner for fifteen years and has enjoyed a unique relationship with cats since she was a little girl. It is no coincidence that her name is Kat !

In 1993, Kat was struck down by **Chronic Fatigue Syndrome (CFS)**. *Choosing to Be* begins with a note about how she descended from her executive office on the top floor of a sleek high-rise tower into the underworld of depression. In the opening chapter she describes how she considered ending her life rather than fighting her exhaustion and debilitating depression.

When **Kat** began writing *Choosing to Be* fifteen years ago, chronic fatigue, sensitivity to environmental pollutants, and other symptoms, were thought to be "all in your head." Anyone who has ever gotten a headache from sitting in a room with the smell of a new carpet, will relate to **Kat's** challenges to function in the day-to-day world.

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## Sicily the Faithful

o live your life in faith and goodness is a very difficult thing to do. Temptations are all around us as we journey through our experiences in life. To maintain a certain amount of integrity and not flinch is not easy. My mother, Carla D'Amico, lived with this integrity her whole life. And Carla's faith was strong.

Early on, Carla wanted to be a nun but when she asked the convent if they would take her the mother superior said she was too young. Carla was 16 years old then. Carla always loved God and always prayed.

She always believed life could be better as she searched for ways to give my brothers and I a good home.

When I was very young, Carla worked in a brewery. She had left my father when I was five years old because he was not really a good man. At the brewery

she made a more than good wage. We didn't have a car and Carla did not drive. She walked to the supermarket and pushed the grocery cart up a steep hill to the apartment where we lived. My mother worked 12-hour shifts. She read books on history and philosophy in her spare time. She played games with us like monopoly, scrabble and chess. When people came over to visit, Carla always offered a great meal. We always had fresh flowers on the table. My mother woud take the three us on the bus to the local library or we would go to the greenhouse nursery to buy plants. Carla is a lover of green plants. She loves flowers so much.

In August, 2003, Carla was diagnosed with lung cancer. She had three quarter of her left lung removed. But then the cancer spread to her brain. In February 2004, the surgeon removed a large tumor from her brain. Her sisters, brother-in-law and niece came to visit from Europe then. Then the cancer spread some more. She had two rounds of chemotherapy and two rounds of radiation. The radation took care of the ten small tumors in her brain. But then the cancer spread to her liver. We took a trip to Houston, Texas, to M.D. Anderson Cancer Hospital to see if there was anything they could do - there was nothing. Carla is now in a nursing home dying.

Carla D'Amico was born in Palermo, Sicily in 1941. Carla is one of seven children. She was married to my father in 1959 at the age of seventeen when she

Otherwise, a

*Forest Adventure Pass* is required on weekends. The **Mt. Pinos** patrol has been active for 28 years

and has been voted number one (with-in the ski patrol ranks) Nordic Ski Patrol several times, most recently in 2006. Patrol members come from a variety of backgrounds, including non-techies like me who are still developing skiing skills. Since the active patrol roster has a lot of talent, learning new ski techniques and having access to the best professional instruction is a major bonus. As a candidate, I learned a lot more about winter than I had ever known before. Winter survival skills, like making emergency shelters and snow caves, dressing and feeding yourself appropriately for these situations, navigating, and avalanche safety, among others, get taught in a thorough and often hands-on way (candidates spend a night in a shelter they make as part of the certification process – don't worry, the patrol has not lost anyone yet). I will never be complacent about being out in the winter backcountry, but I also can enjoy it more that I know how to take care of myself and others in this setting.

**Outdoor Emergency Care and Professional CPR/AED**. While some skills do not get exercised as often as others, packaging potential spinal injury victims on backboards for transportation by helicopter or ambulance happens frequently. Nordic ski areas have a lot less dramatic crashes, but hit-by-tree on the sledding slopes happens a lot. Hypothermia, altitude-related illness, and minor injures are other common things I really came for the our patrol deals with. Being able to help in emergency situations often

carries into the non-snow season when patrol members offer first aid services at special events or just in their daily lives. Teamwork within the patrol and with the U.S. Forest Service is essential. A sense of humor is also a good thing to have when dealing with multiple agencies, emergency services, and the pub-

lic, which can be very Laage, Patrol Director international. There is a whole other side of Mt.

Pinos a lot of the world never sees, but when the mountain entices visitors into dangerous situations, by terrain or weather changes (which can happen quickly), the patrol swings into its search mode. Cell phone service is very tenuous in this wilderness area, mak-

ing communications difficult. The patrol uses radios to keep communications flowing at all times while on duty.

Some patrol members also have search and rescue dogs who are qualified for the winter environment, being able to handle searching in the snow, finding buried victims in avalanche situations, and generally being diplomatic as well as keeping their handlers warm when necessary.

The Mt. Pinos Nordic Ski Patrol also sells packaged snacks, maps, and Forest Adventure Passes to raise funds for first-aid supplies. Most weekends from November to April, depending on the snow from year to year, patrollers are on duty. One weekend a month is required during the season, but most patrollers come more frequently.

Last month, over 1500 dogs were rescued at a Parkersburg, West Virginia breeding facility. The puppy mill capital of the East is Pennsylvania. The **French** do care about animals. A new volunteer group called **Adeo Animals**, which translates to *So Many Animals* in Latin; the objective of the group is to help care for and save homeless animals, strays, victims of accidents and to provide medical assistance, surgery and spay/ neuter services and provide food.

Now that it is getting a little cold and frosty at nights, make certain your dog is kept warm. **Kerry Payne**, manager of a **Wisconsin** humane shelter, rescued an elderly border collie that had spent the night frozen to the sidewalk. Its belly and hindquarters were stuck to the the icy pavement. He was released by having warm water poured over his back and rear quarters.

A very enlightening book, *One at a Time, a Week in an American Animal Shelter* by **Diane Leigh** and **Marilynne Gayer**, explains how 10 to 12,000 animals enter some kind of animal shelter in the US every year with only a 50 percent chance of being adopted. One animal every 40 seconds will be euthanized. It's a very compelling and compassionate book written by former humane shelter workers.

To **Greta** in **Ventura**, who is interested in dog training; no, you don't need to be certified or licensed to be a so-called dog psychic or dog trainer, unlike massagers or hairstylists who need to have a state license and pass a state exam. Anyone, including you, can claim to be a dog trainer, or pet psychic. No state or local license required. I suggest you read *The Dog Listener* by *Jan* 

I suggest you read *The Dog Listener* by *Jan Fennell*. It will teach you how to train and communicate with your dog. Also read *Animals in Translation* by **Temple Grandin**, and **Kathryn Johnson**. The *Rosetta Bone* by **Cheryl S. Smith** tells you the key to communication between humans and canines. It provides the key to unlocking a secret language. It goes beyond understanding nonverbal signals, categorizing canine body language into eyes, ears, mouth, tail and body posture. And lastly, dogs do communicate. In my experience they communicate with their ears, mouth, stance, plus eye contact. I think they rely more on their bodies rather than their vocal cords to communicate. Hope this helps you before beginning your new career.

Did you know over 12 billion animals are killed for food and billions more used for research, hunting and manufacturing. Two good books by attorney **Stephen Wise**, *Drawing the Line*, and *Rattling the Cage* explains it all. **Stephen** has built his reputation defending animals in court, well worth reading.

of all of his or her instinctual needs? The answer is: Proper leadership, discipline, and consistency from his owners.

These qualities in the owner are what give the dog a sense of knowing his place in the family group (or pack), a sense of belonging to a family that understands his instinctual drives and can direct him in their expression in a socially acceptable manner.

When the dog moves with the group he wants to know who is in charge. If the dog cannot sense that

Without proper human leadership through training - the animal takes over rather than looking to his human for directions on how to act in any new situation.

Without the proper human guidance the dog is insecure and his insecure energy causes other dogs to feel insecure.

There are many forms of love. Administration of proper training is a responsible form of love. An irresponsible form of love is to allow the dog to take over, and not to correct the dog when his behavior is aggressive, annoying or dangerous to himself and others. Some people mistakenly fear that if they discipline their dog,

MILITARY WORKING DOG UPDATE

hen Military Working Dog Dexter 3067 alerted to the presence of explosives outside Abu Ghraib Prison he was just doing his job. By his side, his handler M1 Kathleen Ellison, knew that with Dexter as her partner she had "struck gold." Knowing that he had saved her life, she promised him that she would never forget, and that someday she would be back to get him. **Dexter** had struck gold too, in finding **Kathleen**. With **Dexter** returning to his home station in **Naples**, **Italy**, **Kathleen** was issued a new canine partner and deployed to **Afghanistan**, but she never forgot **Dexter**. When she received word that he had been classified as "excess" by the U.S. Military she was determined to make sure that he was not euthanized and that he would be able to retire at home with her. Going through the chain of command she received little encouragement until last April when she was advised to contact Debbie Kandoll of Military Working Dog Adoptions.

Now home at last, after 10 years on foreign soil in the service of his country, **Dexter** is finally back in the **United States of America**. On Dec. 29, **Kathleen Ellison** and **Deb-bie Kandoll** met at a **Naval Support Facility** in **Grigcig**nano, Italy to finally reunite Kathleen and Dexter. As Kathleen had said, "He saved my life, now it's time to save his." Meeting Dexter and calling him by her own personal nickname for him, **Dexter** was ecstatic to see his old friend. "We haven't seen him so happy in months," said a staff member at the facility. "**Dexter** hasn't stopped smiling," said Debbie Kandoll. Although Debbie said she was initially careful how she approached **Dexter**, she soon realized that **Dexter** was "a precious angel." "He's a love muffin", she said with laughter.

Staying overnight at **Rome's Airport Hilton**, then up be fore dawn to arrive at **Fuimicino Airport** in **Rome**, **Dexter** handled everything with German Shepherd bravery and

intelligence. Flying from **Rome** to **Atlanta**, and then to **Milwaukee** where Kathleen Ellison and Dexter were welcomed by media, well-wishers and representatives of veterans organizations **Patriot Rider**, and the **Save-a-Vet Foundation**.

While the vets served up a steak dinner for their K9 hero they made due with snacks for themselves. "He deserves it," said **Post Commander Jerry Kandeziorski**, and everyone agreed. **Dexter** seemed to think it was a pretty good gig as he accepted a large rawhide bone and a bag full of toys for his



retirement package. What's an old dog to do with new toys? Enjoy them and learn to play all over again after years of hard work, discipline, and service Until Kathleen returns to the states permanently, Dexter will be

under the care of Danny Scheurer at the Save-a-Vet Foundation. Danny's goal is to provide a retirement home for all military dogs that cannot be placed in private homes so that none of our retired MWDs will ever have to be euthanized again. "They are our brothers," said Danny.

Many veterans who lived through the heartbreak of having to leave their working dogs behind when American troops pulled out of **Vietnam**, want to make sure that such callous treatment of military dogs never happens again. Of approximately 4,000 dogs which were sent to Vietnam, only 204 came home. Most were destroyed, euthanized, turned over to

the **South Vietnamese Army**, or set free in the jungle. With the passage of the **Military Working Dog Bill H.R.** 5314 in 2000, great progress was made to make it possible that these dogs be adopted into knowledgeable civilian homes, or to retire with their military handlers. However, many dogs still slip through the cracks and are euthanized, despite years of loyal service saving thousands of civilian and military lives. Knowing this, Debbie Kandoll founded Military Working Dog Adoptions to help facilitate place-

ment for these retiring canine war heroes. According to **Debbie**, the reunion of **Kathleen** and **Dexter** would not have been possible without the help of **Congress**man Walter Jones (R-N.C.) and Representative Maurice Hinchey (D-N.Y.). Military Working Dog Adoptions has covered the expense of transporting Dexter back to the states which has depleted their cash reserved for this purpose. They are asking for donations, even the smallest donations are welcome, for the Retiring Military Working Dogs that will be coming home.

The horses have acquired working names from staff which reflect their appearance and personalities. "I could name them all", said Patti, "that's **Partner**, **Windy**, **Casper**, **Race Horse**, **Cricket**, **Lily**," and the list goes on. "This one chose me," said Patti, patting a bay mare "She stands between me and that aggressive mare over there to protect me while I'm feeding". Young and old, the quality of the American racing **Thoroughbred** is apparent to the knowledgeable eye underneath their winter woolies. Some of the older horses have lip tattoos, which means that at one time they had careers on the racetrack. Off and running, I had no idea why my partner started at such a fast pace until we were on a narrow shale path with a steep drop off to my left. "Stay close", my partner explained, "we have to be the first ones on this ledge, because if my horse has anyone in front of him he doesn't look where he puts his feet." Oh great...guess what, oh big cheeseola, my horse doesn't like being in the back either.

I was beginning to get a bit of respect for what real trail riding was all about. As the trail got narrower and the switchbacks got more frequent, I tried hard not to look at the sheer drop-off to my left. I prayed fervently that my horse understood the concepts of gravity and mortality. Reaching the summit, we were rewarded for our temerity with a grandiose view of the Santa Barbara Mountains covered with wild grasses and a view of the islands. Gee I thought, this will make for great conversation at cocktail parties. Up and downhill with people and horses dropping out as we went, we followed the route knowing that there were judges stationed along the way to grade us on our trail-riding technique and horsemanship. Just ahead of me someone was in trouble, evidently they had worn a perfume which the local bees mistook for the

scent of pollen. Whew... I'm glad I just smelled of sweat. Every few miles there was a Pulse and Respiration stop where I would remind the officiating veterinarian that I really didn't care if I won, and to please pull my horse if she showed any sign of distress. Yeah right...do Arabians ever get tired? Not mine...a game little mare I was amazed at her ability to preserve life and keep on trying.

First day survived, that night was a pleasant surprise with campfire music and great barbecued food. Wrapped in a blanket I enjoyed a bit of the old west in the mountains of Santa Barbara. Proud of myself for not being a bit sore, I felt smug about taking the advice of a friend and wearing pantyhose to reduce friction underneath my breeches. My lovely little Arab was looking a bit tired but after a

night's sleep she was ready to go at the crack of O'God in the morning. "Back your horse up between those two boulders" ordered the judge. Oh my god is he kidding !!!! My Arabian mare was hot for the trail and going backward was the last thing on her mind. "How about straight up instead" she said. Yeah ... a likely conclusion, I thought. "Never mind" said the judge, "we don't want anyone getting hurt here". Grrrrr, I hated to give up the fight but rationalized that getting out of bed, tacking up for the trail and then going backwards was indeed a stupid idea, and just maybe the horse was just smarter than both of us.

Uphill and downhill we went, then back through the Paradise Campground. I heard the words "water crossing" shouled from somewhere ahead of me. Up and over the bank and before us spanned a sizeable and scenic river. Proud of myself for being prepared, I had spent months schooling my horse (who thought the world consisted of a 24' pipe corral) on water crossings. Those trips down into the San Antonio Creek really paid off. Gently down the bank and carefully through the water,

we were a picture perfect water crossing with only the mild sacrifice of wetting my custom made boots. Other horses were plunging and swimming, riders shouting. Somehow we had navigated the streambed without hitting the deep spots. Beginner's luck I guess.

Mid afternoon my caffeine deficient brain was beginning to play tricks on me. Scanning the slopes for a coffee shop, I was missing my mid afternoon pick up. "All day I faced the barren waste without the taste of Mary Long and Lacy

Java" Now I was singing to myself. "Coffee ?" said my partner, smirking as he whipped a canned cappuccino out of his saddlebag, and slurped it down in front of my astonished face ... Yeah ... well I only had the "coffee mirage" which flitted in and out of my imagination...visions

of Lorraine smiling and saying "the usual ?" Second day of the ride people were relaxed and friendly, in the true spirit of good sportsmanship. "Your horse looks tired, he needs to rest," said my partner to one of the other competitors. That's interesting, I thought, his horse looks just fine to me. As we rode off my partner shared his philosophy, "Well if you say that to some of these people they will let you ride ahead and they never know the difference." GEEZ....and I thought people

were doing this just for fun !!!!!!!! I instinct just never leaves the generic jerk....mile after mile my partner hogged



I asked that we switch-off, all I could see in front of me was a horse's ass. The reality of riding a three gaited horse behind a singlefooter is that you alternate between fast walk and trot in a frustrating series of accelerations and decelerations to make the 4-6 mile optimum pace for trail riding.

With a monotonous world of arenas, circles, and ridden patterns, getting back to the original relationship of horse and rider as partners in travel reminded me of how much has been

The fact that the **City of Ventura** was the only city in the county that had invested heavily in **Lehman Brothers Holdings Inc.**, **Washington Mutual** and **Bears and Stea-rns** which caused a \$10,000,000 (\$10 mil-lion !) plus loss to the citizens of **Ventura**, and the fact that the city council agreed to huge salary increases and massive pension increases for firefighters which will cost an additional \$1.2 million dollars per year, and the fact that they gave away \$500,000 to the **Ventura Housing Authority**, may of course have something to do with the fact that the **City of Ventura** is suffering much worse than any other city in the county. This election cycle the **City of Ventura** has 4 council seats up for grabs....if the people of the **City of Ventura** really want to show the **Gang in the Ivory Tower**, **(Ventura City Hall**), exactly how they feel about the way they are conducting the business of our city this is the perfect op-portunity. When it comes time to vote all you have to remember is one thing, **VOTE NO ON ALL INCUMBENTS**. If we get enough good people in the council perhaps we can convince them to consider replacing the present top administrators. **Rellis Smith**
