to prevent the failure of key financial institutions. After all, "The cost to let them fail is unthinkahle

In the heat of the stampede, congress and our then president (*George W. Bush*) committed \$700 billion dollars in the Troubled Asset Relief Program (TARP also know as the Bail Out) Āre you sitting down? A year later, only \$370 billion of the \$700 billion has been disbursed. That unto itself isn't entirely a bad thing. Put another way, \$330 billion (almost *half*) hasn't been disbursed.

There are two huge questions: 1) Who did the math to quantify the funds necessary? And 2) What's going on with the undisbursed funds? It is my expectation someone would have done the math first *before* sticking every American citizen with a \$700 billion price tag (That's a 7 with eleven zeros behind it or \$2,300 for every

citizen). How well would it go over in your house if you said, "*Mom, I need* \$70 *for groceries*." utraged and concerned citizens packed Tuesday's Ojai City Council meeting and for over an hour and a half shared their concerns, questions and feelings of helpless rage over the fate of the Aliso St. Bear. There were several residents of Aliso St who had witnessed the ongoing circus and eventual tragedy who spoke from a firsthand experience as well as animal rights experts and activists. Asking for answers from representatives of state Fish and Game and Ojai Police **Department** and hoping for a public hearing with the officials present who had actually attended the incident was the hue and cry.

"It's clear that this needs to be an agenda item" said Suza Francina, former Ojai mayor, forcefully. Suza leaned over the podium in an impassioned address to the current city council to investigate the incident. "At 11 o'clock when I found out that the bear was going to be killed I have never felt so angry and duped in my life..... I felt

When I thought over the conversation again, I read between the lines.....we do not want to kill the bear (but that won't be our decision, only Fish and Game). We want the bear to leave town unharmed (if he goes the direction we want he won't *be killed*). We want to leave an exit for the bear to head up Signal Street to the mountains (*if not, he will be shot*). Even though it was widely believed he came from the direction of Creek Road, passing back the way he came was not an option, now

like I had witnessed a murder...we had been told until the very last moment.... we were lied to.....I don't believe the **Ojai police** lied.....somewhere along the line....I understand why... because if we hadn't been lied to we wouldn't have let this happen."

"Very rarely did our people eat bear because it was a peer. He was a four legged and a two legged, and it was only during those severe famines that bear was eaten. Our medicine men and people were bears. They traveled from the upper valley to the village of **Matilija**; they had very sacred and powerful medicine

LETTER - INCUMBENT IDIOTS What Can't the City of Ventura Do Right? – Brian Lee Rencher



Measure A The **City Council** says they need the Measure A sales tax money to save our ibraries, but a couple of years ago the Ventura Redevelopment Agency granted the Downtown Ventura Organization (DVO) \$500,000 instead of paying back to the City's General Fund the money the Agency owed on its line-of-credit debt. What quantity of library services could the City have provided us with this monev?

Incidentally, over half of the Redevelopment Agency's line-of-credit debt was incurred to build the downtown movie theater and its required parking in **1996** at a cost of approximately **\$9.7 million**. What's more important to the community movie theaters or libraries?

And what about the \$400,000 unsecured loan the council gave a Jaguar auto dealership a couple of years ago. This money was used by Jaguar to pay John Hofer for the ground lease on his empty **KIA** auto showroom building. This is the same John Hofer that owns all of the property around the Ventura Auto Mall and has successfully funded the *winning election* campaigns of four of our past mayors over the last fourteen years Previously he received over **\$3.5 million** in free road construction on his properties and even named one of these streets after himself - Hofer Drive.

Now Mayor Weir, in her speech on July 29, as quoted in the July 30, 2009 edition of *The Star* newspaper says the Measure A sales tax money will be used to enrich Mr. Hofer even more at taxpayer expense. "That \$8 million will stay in the city for us to pave streets and provide better services," she said during a 20minute talk and slide-show presentation covering a range of topics. They included the city's desire to connect Olivas Park Drive to Highway 101, expand the Ventura Auto Center into a regional retail destination, ... "Our goal is to increase the wealth of the city," she said. The Mayor did not mention libraries in her sneech

On Dec. 17, 2007 the Ventura City Council spent the \$5 million in cash that the Redevelopment Agency finally had paid on its line-of-credit debt to the City's General Fund. The council spent this "windfall" of one-time money on the newly created Job Investment Fund (**JIF**). On that date the council already knew it was facing a \$1.9 million deficit. By June, when they adopted the 2008-09 **City Budget**, the deficit had grown to \$4.3 million. The council created the def icit themselves and could have saved the library and prevented this budget shortfall themselves had they not been so reckless with our hard-earned tax *dollars*. Now they want us to tax

ourselves even further to cover their fiscal irresponsibilities.

The next fiscal year. 2009-2010. the Ventura City council lost \$10 million in corporate notes on Wall Street when Washington Mutual and Lehman Brothers went bankrupt [in 2008]. This helped create an **\$11.4 million deficit** in the City's 2009-10 Budget.

To cover their \$4.3 million 2008-09 fiscal budget deficit, the council created the "911 Phone Tax" (over \$1.2 million was never returned – nor was it used to increase public safety), raised City fees 5.56 percent on average, and cut all services by 2 percent so that they could fund the **JIF**. **Three million dollars** of the **JIF** money goes into a statewide fund and *little, if any, is likely to return.* The remaining **\$1.5 million** of the other **\$2 million** is still available in the **City's** treasury and has not yet vaporized. What level of library services could have been funded with the remaining \$700 thousand after covering the **\$4.3 million 2008-09 deficit** if they council had not gambled our money away on the **JIF**? The same goes for the \$10 million lost on Wall Street this [in 2008] year!

The Ventura City Council continues to "promote economic development" with our tax money. Over \$120 million was spent to promote *tourism* by various Ventura City Councils between 1992 and 2004 – approximately \$8 million a year on average - with no measurable positive return on investment. At City Hall, where no actual economists are employed. "Economic Development" means stolen and squandered tax dollars and *dirty little back-room land deals* – not high paying

So, don't vote for Measure A, or the incumbents, this November 3rd unless vou want more of the same and butchered libraries. And, don't vote for their **good** old boy Mike Tracy either – he' the fox watching the hen house.

Mike Tracy promotes himself in this year's Ventura City Council election as $\overset{\sim}{\sim}$ the only candidate that understands how ◎ to really operate a city since he is the only candidate that has been a City department head. But let's look at his record as Ventura's Police Chief.

The day before Mike Tracy began his employment as Ventura's Police Chief. July 25, 1997, his annual salary was \$102,410.10. Upon his retirement date, his salary had grown to **\$173,162.88**. His retirement pay now costs the taxpayers of Ventura \$186,902 a year (due to inflation indexing) - an increase in pay of 82.5 per**cent** and he doesn't have to work another day the rest of his life. He's stated that he will donate his **\$600** a month council pay to the library – how thoughtful of him!

But, how well did he manage the Ventura Police Department when he was in charge? Between 1999 and 2004, serious crimes increased 40.5 percent (as evidenced by the public record recorded in the "Crime In The United States FBI Uniform Crime Reports – City of Ventura", Part 1 Crimes [murder, rape, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and *auto theft*]. Crime went though the roof under his watch! The city's population grew only **5.2 percent** during the same time period. Obviously, he wasn't a very competent top cop. But his pay grew double the increase in crime. Why?

If you vote yes on **Ventura** ballot Measure A, you have no written guarantee that the money will be used to Rencher, Continued Page 24.

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here's an old saying. Recession is when your neighbor is out of a job. Depression is when you're out of a job.

Personal Depression Last week the recession turned into my depression, putting me amongst the unemployed - I was in shock. My first reaction was, why me? What did I do wrong? That lasted about 15 minutes.

My employer was pleased with my performance. He made the difficult decision to jettison some of the "heavier" cargo to keep the plane in the air. After the sting wore off, I'm ok with it. I'm good, but I'm not cheap.

Then came the tough part, telling my family. I've been laid off before, so I know the routine. Walking in the door with the box of my personal stuff (family pictures, my personal *coffee cup*) was the give away. The kids were frightened. "Dad. Are we going to loose our house?" I assured them we would be OK, but we needed to make some changes. Here's my take on a healthy and productive go forward strategy.

Need vs. Want

Grounds: From the Coffee Pot

In Praise of Black Tea by Lorraine Mariz



lack tea is back! New research shows that black tea is nearly as healthy as green tea and contains the same cancer fighting anti-oxidents. So get out the teapot and some good black

tea and go nuts.

If you have been drinking so much green and herbal tea that you forgot how to brew black tea here are some instructions.

What you need.

1. A tea pot - whatever size you need, they come in 2 to 12 cup sizes and in many shapes. Most will make good tea. Many novelty tea pots are not intended for actual use so if you are considering a tea pot shaped like a teddy bear make sure it is not just for show

2. Fresh, cold, good tasting water - If you don't normally drink your tap water don't use it to make tea (or coffee, or ice cubes, or lemonade for that *matter*). Use filtered or bottled water.

3. An Injuser or Strainer if you are using loose tea - The advantage of an infuser is that you can remove the infuser from the tea and not drink it all at once. Infusers come in sizes from the spoon style for 1 or 2 cups to three inch tea balls for 10 to 12 cups. Choose the largest infuser that will fit in the top of your tea pot. This makes for flexiblilty in the amount of tea you make - it is okay to put enough tea for 2 cups in a three inch infuser. Also many teapots now include an infuser. Some tea connois-

Heat the tea pot by filling it with hot water. Measure the tea. In general use one teaspoon of tea per 6 ounces of water. If you are using an infuser make sure the tea takes up no more than 1/3 of the space in the infuser. The leaves need room to expand. Put the kettle on (*start heating the water*). Pour the hot water out of the pot and place the tea inside. When the water boils bring the pot to the kettle (very important) and pour the boiling water into the pot. Make sure the water boils but only let it boil for a few seconds. This will ensure the fullest taste. Steep the tea 3 to 4 minutes according to taste (*less if you use tea bags*). Remove the infuser or bags from the pot when the tea is done steeping. Then serve. Put a tea cozy on the pot if you want the tea to stav hot for more than 1/2 hour or so. If you prefer the tea leaves loose in the pot strain the leaves as you pour the tea into the cup. Serve all the tea at once as any tea left in the pot with the leaves just steeps more and gets bitter and undrinkable. Now enjoy your great cup of tea.

This is the story of a couple, a historic house, a Master Architect and across exactly 80 years, how they L all got together to put heart and soul into a Montecito house, which early on was named the "Casa Debris" I am an avid preservationist, and love to see old beauties set back on their feet again, and still remain true to the golden age of California architecture, the 1920s. I want to report to you, dear readers, that this "Casa Debris" today is looking more like an elegant, mountain-perched, seaward-facing "Casa-Catch the Breeze." Which is exactly what I did when I visited the 22,000 sq ft 1928 Reginald Johnson masterpiece, under divine restoration and met the brilliant designer Peter Kavoian and his partner the genius scientist Ray Winn.



son Italian style Palazzo takes more than just money. (nurchased in 2007) it takes guts. For, vou see. dear reader, vou have to have a vision somewhere in your mind of the

darling into a Princess, and along with that you have to give her the right setting; a gorgeous formal Italian garden, so she can bask in her 6.5 acres overlooking the sea. Peter and Ray have done just that, and their blend of talents is reflected in the nearly finished house today.

Firstly, Ray is a gifted technician, and the house has incredible space age toys like an alarm system, hidden behind the walls with no little pads and boxes, and sends out silent beams Or the invention of a housewide sound system that is unseen,

yet you hear the same music inside, outside and all through the 22,000 feet of the house at a perfect volume. Or chandeliers that can be raised or lowered for cleaning. Of course, Peter is responsible for the design elements, remaining true to the 1920s, for example, traveling to **Buenos Aires** to find the exact period lighting fixtures which have a blend of 1920s decadence and innocence.

Peter has filled every part of the house with architectural elements, which he has found in so many wrecked buildings throughout this country and Europe. For example, one of the upstairs porches, called the "Cuckoo's Nest," boasts Italianate columns on the exterior face of an addition, which were purchased when a hospital in the Midwest was destroyed. Peter heard about it and remembered that this hospital was the setting for "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest', and remembered the exterior shots of the film. So he tracked down those columns for his house. I must say that I couldn't tell the necessary additions to the house, as Peter (also an architect) has blended them so perfectly with Johnson's aesthetic, and claims, rightly, to 'channel' Johnson as he works. The break-out balconies, such as the Cuckoos' Nest, feature the same overhangs, the same Italianate conceits of fenestrations, as the 1929 house. In fact Peter is no stranger to design work having worked for the greats himself; he currently has a design practice in these days of 'hard-to*sell*' property where he will restage a home for a lucrative sale, inside and out, including the garden.

Likewise, the beams in the ceiling, which, if you know **Reginald Johnson's Biltmore Hotel**, are a signature of Johnson's Revival style. Peter researched the treatment of these beams and recreated the elegant, colorful 1920s paint job. No stone is left unturned, as his walls are plaster, and finished with a little known technique called **Venetian**". Not just in one room, but in the many rooms of the house. In fact, some of the tiny servant's rooms and tiny closets of the day have been re-planned, creating more comfortable bedrooms out of what were six chopped up rooms. The master bedroom suite is to die for, with two full big bathrooms and closets, and a sitting room and bar, AND an office, for midnight inspirations. The bedroom is an elegant and inspiring perfect square

with an indoor outdoor fireplace. To restore a When I visited, boxes and crates of all sizes held re-Reginald John-

covered moldings, pieces of ornate wrought iron, stained glass windows and domes, old marble statuary, from all over the world. This is a great way to keep 'true to period' as well as recycle architectural elements from almost 100 years ago, and give them a new home and a new life. Do you ever wonder where demolished '*iunk*' goes ?

Sometimes, sadly, and non eco-friendly, into landfills. But people like Peter and Ray have gone out of their way to rescue huge urns, columns, human figures and sides of wrought iron. Why not? Beats Home Depot dead.

My favorite room in the house is the newly created Garden Room which looks over the formal paterae of

the 6.5 acres of garden, which s anchored by a huge spewing ountain. (I should mention that the scientist Ray has designed a system that will regulate the height f the spew as the sun sets...) In he Garden Room, if you know Reginald Johnson (and you will f you remember the **Biltmore**). **Johnson** liked outdoor spaces that were really indoor and vice versa. Peter took the colonnade that ran across the back of the house which faces the ocean, and glassed it in with period handmade glass panels

from the 1920s, which are framed in the 20s style iron frames that open and latch. Then he built another colonnade outside of this room which is framed by an exquisite huge slab of wrought iron brought over from South America, also antique. And this looks out over the most geometric of their gardens, which is set out in squares and framed

for the left hand side of the formal garden and the other direction on the right side. If you're going to do it, do it right, as the original landscape architect was no other than Lockwood de Forest. When I was there, Peter and Shawn were hard at work on the oak garden, the rose garden, the Asian Garden and koi pond, as well as the formal

There are some differences between some of **Reginald** Johnson's other projects which we have here in our community from the 20s and this house. On the side of the period's **Romantic Regionalism**, that is, taking a period in the past from a very certain place, like Andalusia, and creating a romantic version of it for the present, we have the great Californian Romantic Architects, like Wallace Neff, Templeton Johnson, Bertram Goodhue. George Washington Smith, Carleton Winslow, and **A.B. Harmer** who all worked here in the 20s, along with **Reginald Johnson**. Johnson was especially fond of the Spanish Revival or the Spanish Colonial style, which has become our 'official style'. Look at the **Biltmore** for this. But "Casa Debris", Ray and Peter's house, is a great example of the Mediterranean Tradition in Southern California Architecture which spanned 1905-1935. Since we were in climate and beauty like some of the places in Italy and the Latin parts of the world, why not have a house with this design ? -In 1925 Santa Barbara, began her worldwide reputation as a model of Revivalist Architecture with a blending of Moorish, Spanish Baroque, Spanish and Portuguese Colonial, Andalusian and Mediterranean, with a little Hopi and

I tend to agree; Garibaldi (1807-1882) was an amazing man. He was a military genius who instilled inner power and courage in his men. PAGE 10 VIEW **Making Scents in Your Garden** by Alasdair Coyne

outhern California's climate lends itself to the ready cultivation of many beautifully fragrant plants, which can provide a delightful addition to the home garden.

This article features a number of these fragrant plants, with some hints on how to grow them successfully. My own home is surrounded by many of these wonderful flowers, whose fragrance wafts through the house on spring or summer evenings. Citrus Trees

Ojai is famous for its orange groves, whose fragrance is released more strongly at nighttime. April and May are the peak months in Ojai for orange blossoms, but all citrus varieties have similarly-scented flowers.

Pink Jasmine

This vine does well planted on a fence or against a wall for support, but it can also be left to grow in a mounding form. Like most of these fragrant plants, a full sun location is best. Pink jasmine flowers profusely in April and May, and makes a great choice for a fast-growing screen on a wire fence.

Daffodils and Narcissus

These fragrant flowering bulbs are in many ways perfect plants for Southern California. They require no soil amendments no summer irrigation and they are not eaten by gophers. What's more they multiply on their own gradually expanding over the years from a few bulbs into larger clusters, which can be divided (though this is not necessary for their health). Brugmansia

One of my favorites is this **South American** small flowering tree, a relative of the local (toxic) native datura. It grows quite quickly from a 5-gallon plant from the nursery into a six-foot tree, though you will have to trim off the multiple stems that want to turn the **brugmansia** into a multi-trunked specimen.

Around once a month, through the warmer months the brugmansia is covered with literally hundreds of dangling, 10" long trumpet flowers that exude - only at night - an exquisite, heavenly fragrance. Brugmansias come in single or double bloom forms, and in colors from white to pink to golden yellow. If your brugmansia should freeze in winter, it will grow back very quickly the following year.

Native Plants

he rest of the world an only imagine the idyllic days, hovering somewhere over a hundred Fahrenheit; hot air humming: breezes swirling the fires when they come filling the mountains with flame, smoke and ash. So



it is in a Mediterranean climate, when you're not at the beach. And even Malibu burns.

Xeriscape or drought tolerant planting can create less to burn and is suitable to our climate. Not only California, but also the nation is facing another year of drought. California exists in a state of emergency because of drought, as declared by our governator, Feb. **2008**. May it help us to remember to water in the early or late part of the day, when it's cooler outside. Some parts of Ventura County are enforcing mandates on watering limits and other restrictions to householders, and also handing out fines. This might even enhance our resolve to use native plants in the landscape and mix in some edibles seasonally or permanently as a better return for that water use. Lawns in our climate?!!! Don't get me started.

Our wonderful Mediterranean climate is characterized by warm to hot, dry summers and cool, wet winters. The major **Mediterranean** climates of the world are the areas surrounding the Sea of the same name; the South African Cape, Southern and Western Australia, Central Chile, and much of California. There are other areas 'allied' with these climates as well. Gardeners in these areas enjoy a diversity of native plants (*the* South African Cape endemic flora is the most diverse *in the world*) as well as the beautiful and interesting plants of other similar climates. which sometimes become naturalized ("No, *Eucalyptus* is NOT native to *California*")

There is so much to be learned about appropriate horticulture in our region. Working with the natural forces that shape these unique regions, we can create astonish



Gardenia The gardenia bush is a shrub growing to six feet or higher. The blooms are white and delightfully scented flowering all summer long. Try floating a few gardenia plooms in a shallow owl of water to provide fragrance to your living oom for a few days vour gardenia is a ittle slow to grow, add a nandful or two of alfalfa meal (*nitrogen*) fertilizer around the base of the shrub, where irrigation water will carry it down

he trumpet blooms of a **brugmansia** start producing their heady, exotic scent to the roots This should speed its growth and keep its leaves dark green.

Daphne **Daphne odora** is the Latin name of this shade-loving bush that grows to around three feet in height. Not very common in local gardens, **daphne** deserves to be much more widely grown. Everybody I've handed a sprig of daphne blossoms to in springtime has gone wild about its fragrance – strong, spicy, somewhat lemony, intoxicating.

Lilac Lilacs are not known for thriving in Southern California, but they are well worth trying to grow. There's a property in Matilija Canyon that is fronted by a magnificent lilac hedge. Lilacs are deciduous, meaning that they lose their leaves each winter. The lilac blossoms appear on the plant in spring, as the foliage returns

Star Jasmine

in the evening

This can be grown successfully as a groundcover or to cover a fence. It is more drought-tolerant than most other scented plants in this article. Its sweetly fragrant flowers appear in May, in full sun or even in deep shade Osmanthus

Another scented plant that does well in sun or shade, and which is also drought-tolerant when established. Osmanthus

ing beauty as well as minimal maintenance and water use through climate appropriate plantings.

September, October, and November can be optimum planting times for many drought tolerant plants, giving them good time to get going before the heat of summer The exception might be the frost sensitive plants. Look around you at the neighborhoods nearby. Take a walk. Gardeners are inveterate gabbers, it's just one of the things I love about this genre. Few gardeners want to hoard their

knowledge: triumphs and failures are often recounted at great length, with emotion.

It is always a good idea to do a little bit of research on plants you wish to grow, for other than obvious reasons. Some plants are naturalizing and reducing native populations, causing immense impact in various areas of the world. Even though a little knowledge can be a dangerous thing, some information can be useful. Check it out at: http://invasivespecies. nbii.gov/ Research can be fun with the abundance of resources in our area. We have several garden and hor ticultural groups in Ventura and Santa Barbara counties, along with the amazing Santa Barbara Botanical Garden to explore. Local landscapers and local nurseries also have oodles o experience and information about appropriate plants for you and your specific area. Happy gardening! (all opinions are mine and

is a neat-looking bush similar in leaf to a privet; it also does well as a hedge plant. Its fragrant flowers appear from fall into winter, tiny white blooms with a powerful fragrance of sweet apricot, which can be detected a long way from the plant itself. Heliotrope

This is a smaller plant than most others in this article, which generally does better in a shady location. It is an old-time English garden flower with a purple blossom and a wonderful, rich, fruity fragrance. It may die back in a frost and come back from its roots the following year.

Mock Orange The philadelphus family, which includes the only California native plant in this article (philadelphus lewisii), are noted for their very strong fragrance. The sweet mock orange, phila*delphus coronarius*, grows to eight feet or so. The "mock

orange" common name refers to the blossoms' resemblance to the shape of citrus blossoms, rather than to a similarity in the fragrance itself. Honeysuckle

Another scented vine, which is fairly drought-tolerant when established. Hall's Honeysuckle, the most common variety, grows very quickly as a screen on a fence, with sweet-scented plossoms in late spring.

Night-Blooming Jasmine

A native West Indian shrub, growing to ten feet or taller. The super-strong fragrance emerges in summer, but only at night time. A word of warning - some people find this fragrance too strong to be enjoyable.

Clerodendrum Fragrans

This five-foot tall shrub does well in shade and readily spreads by sending up new stems, or suckers. The delightful sweet scent comes from the broad clusters of flowers that apnear in summer

Naked Ladies

These drought-tolerant bulbs need no care once planted. The Amaryllis belladonna's common name derives from the plant's flower stalk emerging alone from the soil in late summer, when all the bulb's leaves have dried up months earlier. Plant in any garden soil in full sun before the winter rains, which will bring forth the bulb's leaves. No added irrigation is required.

Freesias

Plant these small **South African** bulbs in a sunny spot in the garden. They also do well in a potted garden; after the spring bloom season, when foliage dies back, set the pots aside until new leaves appear in the fall, and begin to water them once again. Scented freesias come in almost every color. Roses

Last, but not least, the rose. Roses have been in cultivation for many millennia – longer than any other plant. Many are not scented but plenty are! Only rarely do I plant a rose without first confirming that it will produce flowers with a delightful fragrance, to be enjoyed in the garden, or inside in a vase.

Italy, Garibaldi was treated like he was the Christ. Giuseppe Garibaldi is an Italian national Hero Garibaldi was born July 4, 1807 in the city of Nice, which at the time belonged to France, before it was given back to the House of Savoy in 1814. Garibaldi came from a poor family At 16 he was drawn to the sea becoming a cabinboy apprentice. In 1832, he became certified as a merchant marine captain. Early on Garibaldi was much influenced by Giuseppe Mazzini – he was an Italian patriot, politician, philosopher and Freemason. In 1831, Mazzini organized a political society called, 'La Giovine Italia' (Young Italy) that was to promote Italian unity. Their motto was, 'God and the people'. Garibaldi joined La Giovine Italia in 1832. He also took an oath in which he dedicated his life to the struggles for liberation of Italy from Austrian dominance.

In the campaign of 1860, known as the *Expedition of the Thousand*, Garibaldi gathered about a thousand volunteers (most of the volunteers had come from the north) - they were called *I Mille* (*the thousand*), known as the **Redshirts**; they landed in Sicily on May 11. Garibaldi engaged the Neapolitan forces in what is called the Battle of Calatafimi on May

According to legend, **Garibaldi** told his lieutenant, **Nino Bixio**, "*Qui si fa l'italia o si muore*" (*Here we either make* Italy or we die). With 800 volunteers against a 1500-strong enemy force, Garibaldi used a "counter-intuitive tactic of ar







uphill bayonet charge" and the redshirts won the battle. The next day, Garibaldi declared himself dictator of Sicily in the name of King Emmanuel II of Italy. Then Garibaldi and his men advanced to **Palermo**, now the capitol of **Sicily**, and launched a siege on May 27th where they were able to defeat the enemy

Garibaldi gained the adulation of the **Italian** people and of people worldwide. The movement of the conflicts in which the unification of

Italy occurred C-T-S is known as II

Risorgimente In **1880** Garibaldi married Fran cesca Armosino: his first wife Anita had died years before. With Francesca he had had three children, and previously had four children

Bear are generally easily spooked also. The maneater myths may apply to grizzly bears in Alaska, but not to the local black bears. This is the reason many climb trees when cornered. Using this information (ask a real experienced wildlife person. Consulting Wikipedia on your I-phone does not cut it.) A logical plan can be formulated to remove the confused and wayward beast from a mutually dangerous situation. A treed bear, for example, is highly unlikely to suddenly decide on a snack of toddler; it is up that tree because it is the safest place in its mind to be. With a little help, it might be persuaded to leave for a less stressful venue. Vacating the area and closing off access except where it needs to go would probably appeal to a scared bear.

In the event that physical extraction is needed, volumes have been written on capture techniques. Careful planning is needed to avoid injury to capture subject and hunting party. Can the animal be persuaded to move lower before sedation? An unconscious animal is a heavy water bag dropping with no control over the position it lands in, hence risk of injury. What level of sedation?

A semi-conscious animal might be able to position itself more safely when descending, but its little brain might also be saying, "Hold on Boo Boo." And you will be stuck with a groggy bear sticking like a burr to the tree. Delivery of immobilizing drugs requires training. Some agents are potent enough to endanger the user if scratched or poked by dart. Darts also have their limitations.

Distance to subject is a concern in planning and target selection on the subject is a concern. A poorly fired dart may not inject the drug and you can have used your one opportunity on getting near a flighty animal. Likewise, a poorly aimed dart might blind, etc. Can an airbag or other padding be placed where the woozy animal is likely to drop? Once on the ground, what is the safest way of transport? It is true that best laid plans can go to hell quickly, but most often risk can be minimized.

If the plan is *not to* provide a lottery winner with a canned hunt and a trophy head, experienced wildlife veterinarians and trained wildlife rehabilitators can advise on what is needed. Lassoing and other physical restraints tend to cause capture myopathy, a muscle disorder and other injuries. Some species of wildlife. like deer, are more prone to this.



Identifying and monitoring nuisance wildlife can help avoid the problem of reoccurrences by the same or other animals. In dry seasons or when resources are scarce. wildlife is more likely to stray into populated areas. Communities that have had to deal with frequent wildlife visitation are prepared by making their trash cans inaccessible and securing doors and gates against easy access with latches that cannot be easily opened. Many books are available to advise on keeping deer and other wildlife out of gardens with plants that discourage and repel. Karelian Bear Dogs have been successful in Yosemite and other areas persuading bears to not only leave, but also not return. They have been more successful than trapping and fireworks because the bears can relate to the threat more. Leave or be bit, hmmmm. - Janet McNeil, D.V.M.

were, in the pine tree on Aliso Street on Saturday, Oct. 10 it was an exciting experience. I had mixed emotions about it. I was deeply moved to see so magnificent a creature up close; and I was sad that he appeared to be trapped in the tree. The situation was *loadea with potential danger* for bear and people as well as other animals and

property. My sense of the bear was one of tiredness and fear to come down from his tree perch and face all the people and traffic on the ground. I imagine he came looking for food and water at night, and got frightened by dogs barking and sought the shelter of the tree. Before he knew it it was morning and a crowd had gathered and he was afraid to come down. I was told he had been in the tree since the night

before. I asked one of the police officers on the scene if Fish and Game could tranquilize and remove the bear to a safer location. I was *told* they would not do that because it was *bear hunting season*. They said if a hunter legally shot and killed the bear and ate the bear meat he would be affected by the tranquilizer drug in the bear meat, if it hadn't had time enough to be metabolized. I spoke with Captain O'Hanlon. Oiai Police watch **commander** the afternoon of the **Oct**. 10 incident who said the police department had been in conversation with the **Fish and Game Department** since the early morning. He said they were attempting to enlist their aid because the police department was concerned about the size and location of the bear in the tree. He further said that, as of the time of our phone conversation (1:30 **pm**), he was told that two fish and game officers were in process of responding but they were about a half hour away. He said he was hoping they would tranquil-

ize and remove the bear to a safer location. Since the situation was first attended to by the police, he was relying on the advice of his officers on the scene. They felt if they gave the bear enough space, he might come down from the tree and return to the hills As the day wore on, however,

That higher expectations should be placed on the city of **Ojai**, with it's history as a spiritual center, seemed to be the overriding sentiment at the meeting, with a willingness on the part of the Ojai City Council and Ojai Police Depart**ment** to look at developing a plan for future incidents so that this disaster never happens again.

Others were upset at what they viewed as the inhumane destruction of the bear and how the eventual euthanasia was handled Especially moving was the initial address of eve-witness Chris Nottoli, resident of Aliso St. "I was approximately 20 vards away from the base of the tree when the bear fell under bright lights, tranquilized, he smashed through some limbs, and bounced off others then he went through a big cactus and smashed a fence... and then he was DONE....virtually no one witnessed that. Me, the guy across the street, Fish and Game and the Ojai Police. Nobody should have the memory of that in their head. But everyone **RIGHT** NOW needs to. Because if we don't, then that's going to happen again!

Ojai Pet Psychic Laura Stinchfield was also upset at the tranquilizing of the bear, which was reportedly shackled and then removed to an undisclosed location where it was euthanized.

She reminded listeners that "being a pet psychic I do know that when animals are tranquilized they still have consciousness... they do have an awareness of what's going on. That bear did know that he fell out of a tree. he did know that he was suffering... I think that needs to change......I don't think we actually heard the end of the story

The struggle between the ideal and the real left no one unscathed, with the affable **Marty Wall** of **Fish and** Game bemoaning the fact that no one seemed to remember that it was he who recently relocated a small **Mountain** Lion from the Ojai Valley. He said he had saved it from destruction and placed it in a wildlife sanctuary where it could live it's life out safely. After the mountain lion had been tranquilized and inspected it was discovered to have a metabolic bone disease which would have caused its eventual demise in its native habitat. According to Wall, had it not been hunting season (during which time bears which have been tranquilized may not be released for 14 days until the sedative has had time to be metabolized out of their system.) They could have coaxed the bear out of the tree by hosing it with a firehose, pelting it with tennis balls or bean bags. "They climb the tree because they think it's safe, so when it's no longer safe they usually come down.

Although private rescue organizations had offered holding areas, the final call was made by Roland Takayama of Fish and Game to destroy the animal in keeping with the regulations of

bear earlier. They said that because it is bear hunting season they will not release a tranquilized bear into the wild, as said by officers before, because a hunter could kill the bear and eat the meat tainted with the tranquilizer.

Surely there must be a way to tag a bear after tranquilizing it so a hunter could recognize the tag and either not kill it or not eat the meat.

I don't blame those officials who were forced to react in the best way *they knew to insure public safety*, but there must be a way to remove a bear from a tree and relocate it safely.

Ojai Police Chief Capt. Chris Dunn also regained the podium at the close of the meeting with a heated defense of his department. "We've been accused of a lot of things tonight, but I can tell you one thing... we are not liars, and it was not our intention from the get go to kill this bear. Never was All of our deputies were distraught over the fact that this bear had to be destroyed including myself. Proof of that is that I would not have authorized the resources from our department to maintain the perimeter that we had, and the size of the perimeter we had was quite large for a department of our size," he said.

Keeping the peace and finding solutions so that this incident is never repeated was the fervent desire of those present. The unmovable force they couldn't seem to get around being the federal law that the state Fish and Game Department is required to adhere too. Talk was floated, about the possible formation of a Bear League such as exists in areas like Lake Tahoe where the invasion of bears is a daily occurrence and is handled without the presence of Fish and Game officials.

For each person killed by a black bear, 147 people die from being attacked by a dog, over 400 people die from bee stings, and 90,000 human beings are murdered at the hands of other people.

Since this is the opening of *Bear Hunting Season*. could it be that this bear might have sought the valley of it's ancestors and the native home of the **Chumash** people as a refuge only to be thrown back into the unconscious mindset of the hunter?

Perhaps the most sage and practical advice of the evening came from Charles Moore, eight-years-old, who bent the microphone down to his height to make his statement. "Ok... why didn't they put a bear bag at the bottom of the tree? Umm... and..my dad has some friends who live in California, I don't know where it's called... bears come down every day there and they eat the avocados on the trees and they go in the guys' yards and they go in their houses and the guys just have to open the door... and the bear goes out. I guess that's all I have to say."

Yes indeed...why couldn't the city of **Ojai** just have opened the door and "LET THE BEAR GO OUT !!!!!! - Mary M. Long, Oia

Editor's Note: According to VIEW columnist and vet-erinarian Dr. Janet McNeil, D.V.M., "Most supervising officials have leeway to use resources, especially if they are not costing money (everyone's #1 factor). Do they? Did you know that most adults are held back from what they could be doing or would love to do because of their school experiences? Did vou know that being labeled slow, lazy, learning disabled, dyslexic, ADD, or even average or gifted stays with you forever, and affects what you believe about yourself and your abilities? Did you know that people in their forties, fifties and sixties, no matter what they've accomplished, are still controlled by messages they received in school?

I'm thinking of a woman who didn't think she could advance in her business because when she was in school she got the message that she wasn't very capable. What was the problem in school? She kept tapping her foot and wiggling in her chair because she is kinesthetic and needs to move to learn. Another adult comes to mind who spent years in a career she disliked because she didn't think she was smart enough to do what she really wanted to do – teach. Others are held back because they are not great spellers, reading is not a strength or memorizing is difficult for them. So what? These things really have nothing to do with success

The most powerful determiner of success is the belief that you are capable and can succeed. Yet, for thirteen of the most formative years of our children's lives our school systems emphasize mistakes, failures, and a narrow definition of what it means to be "smart." These children grow up to be adults who settle for less.

Studies done several years ago revealed that 95 percent of kindergartners feel good about themselves and are eager to learn, and fewer than 2 percent of seniors in high school feel good about themselves. Pedro Garcia, then superintendent of the Corona-Norco Unified School District, commented on these results: "What happens to children between the ages of 5 and 18 that they lose that creative, inquisitive spirit... Children need to feel safe...We need to create a safe home and a safe classroom for them...Children need to be frequently validated, encouraged, supported... They need to know they have talents and abilities they have not yet discovered. Above all, they need to know they can be successful.

Rubber Stamp Teaching Approach

Far too many pay a very high price in our one-size-fits-all education and testing system. Yet there is a very simple answer, but the powers that be are not

As long as we force all kids to start reading at 4 or 5-years-old, force everyone to use textbooks and workbooks, and force all students to learn and be tested in the same way. No Child Left **Behind** will never come to be. Many many children will continue to be *left behind*, along with countless adults who are not able to reverse the damage done to them as students

What are the alternatives?

 Respect developmental timetables - realize that kids are ready for concepts at different ages, not when the State says they must be !

• Provide various ways for kids to learn and do assignments, such as games. books on tape, art supplies, building activities, scrapbooks, experiments, demonstrations, etc.

• Instead of using destructive labels, look at learning styles...for example, Picture and Hands-on learners are often labeled dyslexic, Inventing and/or Thinking/Creating learners most often end up being labeled ADD.

Impossible, you say, with a roomful of students? Not impossible at all. The best teachers have figured out how to do it even with all the constraints put on them. And if you are homeschooling, customizing to your child's learning style is a snap !

Whether we are talking about the classroom or the homeschool, if vour goal is learning success for EVERY child, you can do it. You can be a Success Coach for the children in your life ! M.P.Willis

without exception exactly the same benefits. Conversely, we should not support any proposal that sets up any different or special provisions for elected officials, appointees, or government employees.

The inclusion of all US citizens will insure that we do not further perpetuate benefits for "the ruling class" that are different from those for "the rest of us"

This country was founded on the concept that we are all created equal in terms of each person's ability to access medicine, education, justice and all other societal henefits

If we are all of equal opportunity, and if medical care is to be a right that includes everyone, there can be no logical basis for separate benefits for any class among us.

I'm highly suspicious of the legislation now in process. Several times I've called the offices of **Senator Boxer** and Senator Feinstein to ask whether members of Con-

gress and staff are included in the proposed legislation. The Senators' staffs have refused to answer that simple question, saying variously (a) "The Senator has not issued a position paper on that question", (b) "You will have to wait until the final bill is passed?, (c) "I (the staff member) am included in the benefits assigned to members of Congress", or (d) "We don't know"

From their non-answers on the largest issue of the day, I can only conclude that there must be special provisions for Congress, but our Senators do not want to admit that fact. What other facts are they hiding?
